

Sexually Transmitted and Blood-borne Infections

- In November 2011, the number of reported cases of chlamydia and gonorrhoea continued to increase. Year-to-date for 2011, 9,075 cases of chlamydia and 1,803 cases of gonorrhoea were reported to Toronto Public Health, representing increases of 11% and 20%, respectively, over the same time period in 2010.

Enteric, Food and Waterborne

- Seventy-four cases of *Campylobacter* enteritis were reported in November 2011, a 10% increase in the 2011 year-to-date count compared to the same period in 2010. Of the 14 cases with known and reported exposure information, nine cases were travel-related, four cases were locally acquired, and one case had contact with a known case.

Vaccine Preventable Diseases

- The 2011/2012 influenza season in Toronto is off to a slower start compared to previous seasons. Three cases of influenza were reported in November, where the previous 3-year average was 230 cases for the same month. In the current season-to-date, no outbreaks of influenza have been reported to Toronto Public Health.
