DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST PURSUANT TO THE MUNICIPAL CONFLICT OF INTEREST ACT.

CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES. (July 20, 2000)

DEPUTATIONS/PRESENTATIONS.

COMMUNICATIONS/REPORTS:

1. CITY OF TORONTO'S RESPONSE TO "REVIEW OF THE GTSB – PHASE 1 REPORT, ADDRESSING GTA-WIDE CHALLENGES".

<u>Chief Administrative Officer</u>. (September 5, 2000)

Recommending that:

- (1) Toronto City Council reaffirm its support for the Greater Toronto Services Board and its role as a representative political body that has a legislated mandate to deal with region-wide issues in the GTA;
- (2) because of the need to coordinate and facilitate effective growth management strategies in the Greater Toronto Area, reduce or limit sprawl, maximize the use and effectiveness of existing and planned infrastructure and protect important environmental features, the Greater Toronto Services Board request the provincial government to amend the "Greater Toronto Services Board Act, 1998" to:

- (a) require the Greater Toronto Services Board to adopt a GTA urban structure plan and master plans to guide the provision and optimal use of major region-wide infrastructure including transportation, water and sewer facilities;
- (b) make the GTA urban structure plan and infratsructure master plans implementable by vesting authority in the Greater Toronto Services Board to:
 - approve, or appeal to the approval authority, environmental assessments for major inter-regional infrastructure based on consistency with the GTA urban structure and infrastructure master plans; and
 - (ii) support or appeal land use decisions to the approval authority, including the Ontario Municipal Board, based on consistency with the GTA urban structure and infratsructure master plans; and
- (c) vest authority in the Greater Toronto Services Board to prepare policy statements on significant region-wide planning and land use matters, for example, future development on the Oak Ridges Moraine, and protection of groundwater quality in the GTA, and specifically provide that the GTSB be given standing in any hearing where such policy statements are considered;
- (3) copies of this report be circulated for information to the Premier of Ontario, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing and the Council Heads of all GTSB member municipalities; and
- (4) the appropriate City Officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

1(a) Executive Director, Greater Toronto Services Board. (July 6, 2000)

Advising that the Greater Toronto Services Board on June 30, 2000, adopted Clause 1 of Strategic Planning and Review Report No. 2 directing that the Review of GTSB – Phase 1, Addressing GTA-wide Challenges, be circulated to member municipalities and other GTA stakeholder organizations with a request that comments be forwarded to the GTSB office no later than September 30, 2000; and attaching the Terms of Reference for the review as adopted by the GTSB.

2. FCM GREEN FUND APPLICATIONS, REPORT ON ACTIONS BY THE CAO.

<u>Chief Administrative Officer</u>. (August 15, 2000)

Recommending that:

- (1) the actions of the Chief Administrative Officer under the authority granted by City Council at its meeting of August 1, 2 and 3, 2000 with respect to making applications to FCM's Green Fund programs be confirmed and authority be granted to receive FCM funding for successful applications;
- (2) any external funds received for the identified projects, including FCM and Toronto Atmospheric Fund grants, be credited to the Environmental Plan Implementation revenue and expenditure accounts established by Council at its meeting of August 1, 2 and 3, 2000; and
- (3) the appropriate City Officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

3. EXPRESSION OF INTEREST TO HOST 2005 FCM CONFERENCE.

Chief Administrative Officer (August 1, 2000)

Seeking Council authority to submit an expression of interest to host the annual conference of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) in 2005; and recommending that:

- (1) Council extend an invitation to the Federation of Canadian Municipalities to hold its 2005 Annual Conference and Trade Show in Toronto conditional upon reaching a host city agreement that eliminates the risk of the City using the tax levy to meet host city obligations; and
- (2) the appropriate City officials be authorized to give effect thereto.

4. INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL FOR LOCAL ENVIRONMENTAL INITIATIVES (ICLEI) – HOST AGREEMENT.

<u>Chief Administrative Officer</u> (September 7, 2000)

Recommending that:

(1) the Chief Administrative Officer be authorized to conclude the negotiations for an extension of the host agreement between the International Council for Local Environmental Initiatives (ICLEI) and the City of Toronto for a further 5 years from

January 1, 2002 to December 31, 2006, and inform Council about the results and financial implications of the negotiations upon completion; and

(2) the appropriate City Officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

5. CONSULTING SERVICES IN 1999.

<u>Chief Administrative Officer</u> (September 6, 2000)

Summarizing the consulting services contracted by Departments, and major Agencies, Boards and Commissions of the City in 1999; advising that both overview and detailed analysis of the data is included; that data is presented in a variety of ways including consulting expenditure as a percentage of total City budget, consulting contracts by Project Category, and the incidence of consulting contracts by value ranges; that the report on contracting of consulting services is prepared annually as approved by Council in July 1999; and recommending that this report be received for information.

6. CIVIC PARTICIPATION IN THE CITY OF TORONTO.

Chief Administrative Officer (September 7, 2000)

Updating Council on the civic engagement initiative "Building the New City of Toronto: Reflections on Civic Engagement; advising that on March 2, 1999, the City of Toronto adopted four key principles of civic participation; that it was recommended that the Chief Administrator's Office organize a public forum on civic participation to seek input from Toronto residents on effective and meaningful ways of involving the public in political decision-making; that as part of this commitment, the Strategic and Corporate Policy/Healthy City Office worked in cooperation with City staff in other departments to organize a five part discussion series exploring the notions of civic engagement and community participation; that this series provided a unique opportunity to engage elected officials, academics, City staff and Toronto residents in a dialogue on how to strengthen civil society in Toronto; and recommending that this report be received for information.

7. THE RELATIONSHIP OF FIVE CHARTER CITIES AND THEIR PROVINCES.

Chief Administrative Officer (September 5, 2000)

Summarizing the current relationship between five Canadian Cities and their Provinces and to draw lessons for the City of Toronto's request to become a Charter City; advising that this report has reviewed the relationships between five Canadian Cities and their respective Provinces; that the research findings reinforce the value of a City Charter for Toronto as a mechanism to package a set of "custom-built" powers and responsibilities that match the City's particular situation and needs; that the research shows that there is a trend in Canada

towards modernizing the relationship between cities and their provinces; that the tendency is towards greater empowerment of cities and recognition of them as an order of government; that the Charters in the cities reviewed in this report reflect the thinking and conditions of the periods in which they were enacted; that the cities are seeking renewal of their Charters and the incorporation of modern principles of local government, which are also helping to shape municipal legislation of more general application; that there is much for Toronto to learn from the experiences of cities and provinces across Canada, and much to contribute to new ways of thinking about the role of cities in the twenty-first century; and recommending that this report be received for information.

8. CITY OF TORONTO QUARTERLY INVESTMENT REPORT AS AT JUNE 30, 2000.

<u>Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer</u> (August 29, 2000)

Summarizing the holdings in the City's investment portfolio and reporting on current investment practices; advising that the City continues to realize returns on its investments that generally exceed established benchmarks; that interest earnings attributable to the operating budget are projected to exceed the budget expectations by year-end; that the City's investments are in compliance with the Council adopted investment policies; that a comprehensive review of the City's Investment Policies and Procedures is currently in progress; that although changes to specific issuer limits are pending, at this time there are no recommended changes until the review is complete; and recommending that this report be received for information.

9. POLICY ON MANAGEMENT OF SURPLUS.

<u>Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer</u> (August 31, 2000)

Recommending that:

- (1) the surplus carried forward be zero by the 2004 fiscal year and that this be accomplished by reducing the surplus carried toward in 2001 to a target level of \$30 million, in 2002 to \$20 million and 2003 to \$10 million;
- (2) a Tax Rate Stabilization Reserve Fund be established for the purpose of funding any operating deficit and to which any operating surplus would be applied with a target level of one percent of property taxes by 2004;
- (3) By-Law 181-2000 (reserves and reserve funds by-law) be amended by adding the Tax Rate Stabilization Reserve Fund to Schedule C;
- (4) the Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer be authorized, consistent with Recommendation No. (1) and No. (3) above, to apply any additional surplus, in priority order to:

- (a) fund the Tax Rate Stabilization Reserve Fund (if below its target);
- (b) Capital Financing Reserve Fund (at least 10% of the additional surplus); and,
- (c) the remainder to fund any unfunded liabilities, or otherwise proven inadequacy in a reserve or reserve fund on the basis of highest risk of immediate property tax impact as determined by the Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer;
- (5) the Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer shall report such contributions as per Recommendation No. 4 to the Budget Advisory Committee no later than four weeks following the closing of the accounts for the prior year; and,
- (6) the appropriate City Officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

10. FINANCIAL IMPACTS OF LOCAL 79 STRIKE.

<u>Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer</u> (September 7, 2000)

Recommending that:

- (1) the revised accounting treatment, identified below, to isolate the strike related savings and capture the strike related costs be approved:
 - (a) the departments' actual expenditures be increased by the amount of the strike related salary savings and transferred to corporate contingency account, so as to isolate the savings;
 - (b) the strike related costs be charged to the identified corporate contingency account; and
 - (c) the strike related revenue loss be reimbursed to the departments by a draw from the corporate contingency account, so as not to cause any in year variances; and
- (2) the appropriate officials be directed to give effect to the above.

11. ANNUAL FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF TORONTO HYDRO CORPORATION.

<u>Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer</u> (August 28, 2000)

Providing the annual financial statements of Toronto Hydro Corporation to the Shareholder; advising that subsequent to its incorporation of July 1, 1999, and in accordance with the Shareholder Direction relating to Toronto Hydro Corporation, the Corporation has provided the Shareholder with its audited annual consolidated financial statements; that this report has

highlighted key financial results of the Corporation for the 1999 fiscal year; and recommending that this report be received for information.

12. REVIEW OF BUSINESS REFERENCE GROUP RECOMMENDATIONS, PROPOSED TAX POLICY TOOLS FOR 2001 ASSESSMENT.

<u>City Clerk</u> (June 16, 2000)

Advising that City Council, at its meeting held on June 7, 8 and 9, 2000 June 7, 8 and 9, 2000, directed that Clause No. 1 of Report No. 7 of the Policy and Finance Committee headed "Review of Business Reference Group Recommendations, Proposed Tax Policy Tools for 2001 Assessment" be struck out and referred back to the Policy and Finance Committee, for further consideration, and that the Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer be requested to clarify, with provincial officials, the reasons why City Council's previous request for the policy referenced in the following Recommendation No. (1)(iv)(b) of the Policy and Finance Committee, was modified to allow only an eight-year cap, rather than a permanent change for this tax class, and submit a report thereon to the Policy and Finance Committee for consideration therewith:

"(1)(iv)(b) the optional 'New multi-residential' class that taxes newly-constructed rental buildings at the residential rate for an eightyear period be changed to allow for a permanent tax rate reduction for this class;".)

12(a). TAX POLICY PLANNING FOR 2001 AND BEYOND: PROPOSED WORK PLAN.

<u>Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer</u> (August 22, 2000)

Recommending that:

- (1) Council approve in principle the proposed work plan for tax policy planning as set out in this report; and
- (2) Council approve expenditures to a maximum of \$500,000.00 to cover the costs of hiring external consultants, as necessary, to assist in the development of tax policy and in the redesign and reconfiguration of tax billing systems, to be funded from the Corporate Contingency for 2000.

13. RELEASE OF CASH-IN-LIEU RESERVE FUNDS FOR INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENTS ON NEILSON ROAD, SOUTH OF FINCH AVENUE (SCARBOROUGH MALVERN).

<u>Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer</u> (August 17, 2000)

Recommending that the Release of \$100,000.00 from the former Scarborough Cash-in-lieu Reserve Fund for roads: 70691-853 (SAP# 350214 – Reserve Funds, Subdividers Deposits) be approved to fund implementation of a widening on Neilson Road to accommodate a southbound left turn lane at Neilson Park Drive, south of Finch Avenue.

14. 2000 WRITE-OFF OF UNCOLLECTIBLE BUSINESS TAXES FROM THE COLLECTORS ROLL.

<u>Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer</u>. (September 13, 2000)

Seeking authority to strike off from the Tax Collector's Roll certain taxes deemed uncollectable by the Treasurer; advising that by Council approving the strike-off of these identified uncollectible taxes, approximately \$2.8 million will be recovered from the School Board this year; that this report was unfortunately late for the Administration Committee agenda closing, however in order to charge back the School Board their portion of the bad debt, Council must approve this report prior to December 31st, 2000; and recommending that:

- (1) uncollectible business taxes of \$8,123,060.23 be striken from the Tax Collector's Roll pursuant the provisions of Section 441 of the *Municipal Act;* and
- (2) the amount attributable to uncollectible taxes from Business Improvement Areas (BIA) in the amount of \$21,687.64 be written off as a receivable under Section 441.

15. LIGHT VEHICLE FLEET LEASE FINANCING AND MANAGEMENT SERVICES.

Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer <u>Commissioner of Corporate Services</u> (August 28, 2000)

Recommending that:

- (1) the City not enter into a light vehicle fleet lease financing contract or vehicle management service contract with any of the proponents to the Request for Proposal at this time; and
- (2) the Commissioner of Corporate Services consider light vehicle fleet lease financing and vehicle management services when preparing the strategic plan and organizational structure for fleet maintenance management for the Administration Committee by February 2001.

16. REDIRECTION OF SCHOOL RENT FUNDS TO SUPPORT YORK BEFORE AND AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS.

<u>Commissioner of Community and Neighbourhood Services</u> (September 6, 2000)

Recommending that:

- funding allocation for occupancy costs for children's services located in the Toronto District School Board facilities be reduced by \$160.0 thousand in 2000 and \$240.0 thousand in 2001 in order to accommodate payment of TDSB's share of operating subsidy of York Before and After School Programs;
- (2) funding allocation for York Before and After School Programs be increased by \$160.0 thousand in 2000 and \$240.0 thousand in 2001; and
- (3) the appropriate City officials be authorized to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

17. INFLUENZA IMMUNIZATION FOR CITY OF TORONTO EMPLOYEES.

Medical Officer of Health (September 7, 2000)

Recommending that:

- (1) new expenditures of \$120,512.00 for an influenza immunization program for City of Toronto employees (excluding Special Purpose Bodies) be approved for the year 2000 and funded through a reallocation of under-expenditures in the Public Health Operating Budget. Details of these expenditures in 2000 that can be re-allocated for this purpose will be reported through Public Health September 2000 Operating Variance;
- (2) funding for the influenza immunization program beyond 2000 be considered as part of the Employee Health Services, Human Resources Division 2001 operating budget process; and
- (3) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect to the foregoing.

17(a). <u>Secretary, Board of Health</u> (July 26, 2000)

Advising that the Board of Health on July 24, 2000, recommended to the Policy and Finance Committee:

(A) adoption of the following Recommendations Nos. (1) through (4) embodied in the report (July 11, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health:

"It is recommended that:

- (1) the City of Toronto Employee Health Services offer influenza vaccination at no charge to all city employees beginning in the fall of 2000;
- (2) Employee Health Services contract out the provision of on-site influenza immunization clinics across the City;
- (3) City Council approve the expenditure of \$187,064.00 to provide influenza immunization to City employees;
- (4) the estimated cost of this program be absorbed within the 2000 approved Operating Budget within Public Health and that a report be submitted to the Policy and Finance Committee on details of this expenditure and the underexpenditures in 2000 that may be re-allocated for this purpose, as part of the 2000 Operating Budget Variance reporting process;"
- (B) for subsequent years, funding for the influenza immunization program for all City employees be provided from an appropriate Operating Budget, for example, from the Human Resources Division, and not from the Toronto Public Health budget;
- (C) Toronto Public Health host an "influenza immunization clinic" during a meeting of Council and that Members of Council, employees, and the media be invited to such clinic; and
- (D) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect to the foregoing.

18. INTEGRATED FIRE AND POLICE RADIO COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM SIX MONTH STATUS REPORT.

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services Fire Chief, Chief of Police (August 16, 2000)

Providing the third semi-annual status report on the Integrated Fire and Police Radio Communications System; forecasting that there will be no changes to the final project cost for the radio communications systems; that possible savings due to optimization of system performance will allow us to strive to achieve the best cost performance ratio; that implementation and operation of phase one is scheduled for November 26, 2000, but the phase two completion date of June, 2001 has slipped to October, 2001; that "Critical Design Review" milestone, the phase one Factory Acceptance Milestone and the phase two Factory Acceptance milestone have been completed; and recommending that this report be received and forwarded to the Community Services Committee for information.

19. ADJUSTMENT TO 2000 TORONTO EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES BUDGET.

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (August 17, 2000)

Requesting an adjustment to the 2000 Toronto Emergency Medical Services Operating Budget to reflect increased funding from the Ministry of Health to offset increased operating expenses; and recommending that:

- (1) the Toronto Emergency Medical Services operating budget be increased by \$78,000.00 and the provincial grant be increased by the corresponding amount; and
- (2) the appropriate city officials be given the authority to give effect thereto.

20. AMENDMENTS TO VEHICLE AND EQUIPMENT REPLACEMENT PROGRAMS FOR SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT SERVICES.

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (September 7, 2000)

Recommending that:

(1) City Council amend clause 7 of Report 10 of the Policy and Finance Committee by revising Appendix B, headed "Vehicles to be Replaced", as embodied in the joint report dated June 19, 2000, from the Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer and the Commissioner of Corporate Services, under the Service Area "Solid Waste" as follows:

21. FUNDING FOR PESTICIDE REPLACEMENT PROGRAM PARKS AND RECREATION DIVISION – ALL WARDS.

<u>Commissioner of Economic Development, Culture and Tourism</u>. (September 11, 2000)

Advising that in the City of Toronto approved Operating Budget, it was recommended that the Commissioner of Economic Development, Culture and Tourism absorb the expenditure of \$175,000.00 for the pesticide replacement program from within the Parks and Recreation 2000 Operating Budget, and, if this funding is not available, in whole or in part, the Commissioner of be requested to report thereon to the Policy and Finance Committee, no later than September, 2000; that funding for the first year of a reduced phased pesticide replacement program could not be taken from the 2000 Operating Budget; that due to ongoing budget pressures, the current 2000 budget cannot support this expenditure at this time; that as a result, the continued reduction in pesticide usage without a negative impact on greenspace maintenance is in jeopardy; that the Parks and Recreation Division will resubmit this program for consideration in the 2001 operating budget as a budget pressure; and recommending that this report be received for information.

22. TORONTO ARTS COUNCIL LOAN PROGRAM.

President, Toronto Arts Council. (September 12, 2000)

Recommending that the City approve the transfer of \$21, 211 from the Toronto Arts Council Loan Program to the Toronto Arts Council Administration Program to eliminate the accumulated deficit; and advising that there are no financial implications for the City of Toronto arising from this recommendation; and that the Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer has reviewed this report and concurs with the financial impact statement.

Advising the Policy and Finance Committee and City Council of the proposed transfer of financial and administrative responsibility, along with appropriate funding, for the Beach Lifeguard Program from the City of Toronto to the Toronto Police Service effective January 1, 2001; and recommending that:

- (1) the Policy and Finance Committee approve the transfer of administrative and financial responsibility, along with appropriate funding in the Toronto Police Service base budget for the Beach Lifeguard Program from the City of Toronto Police Service effective January 1, 2001; and
- (2) following consideration of Recommendation No. 1, the Policy and Finance Committee forward this report to Council for approval.

24. TORONTO POLICE SERVICE RESPONSE TO THE CITY AUDITOR'S RECOMMENDTIONS REGARDING THE PARKING ENFORCEMENT UNIT.

Chairman, Toronto Police Services Board (August 17, 2000)

28. MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS REQUEST – TORONTO ZOO.

<u>General Manager and CEO, Toronto Zoo</u> (September 7, 2000)
