DEPUTATIONS/PRESENTATIONS:

THE FOLLOWING ITEMS 1-7 ARE SCHEDULED AS DEPUTATION ITEMS - 10:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m.

1. DRAIN GRANT APPEAL -148 HUMBERCREST BOULEVARD.

Councillor Bill Saundercook, <u>Chair, Works Committee</u> (January 20, 2000)

Recommending that the Mr. Sean Griffin, owner of 148 Humbercrest Boulevard, be reimbursed for expenses in the amount of \$1,500.00 incurred in repairing damages caused by roots from a tree at 152 Humbercrest Boulevard, as the tree was not removed at the City's request.

2. DRAIN GRANT APPEAL – 101 FERMANAGH AVENUE.

Doug Bennet and Nancy Clark <u>Toronto, Ontario</u> (July 21, 2000)

Appealing the decision by the City in denying a grant under the Drain Grant Program with respect to the property, 101 Fermanagh Avenue; and requesting reimbursement of costs in the amount of \$1,000.00 to help defray the costs of repairs caused by a City-owned tree.

3. DRAIN GRANT APPEAL – 21 KIRK BRADDEN ROAD EAST.

Ms. Deborah Wright Etobicoke, Ontario (June 29, 2000)

Appealing the decision by the City in denying a grant under the Drain Grant Program with respect to the property 21 Kirk Bradden Road East, Etobicoke.

4. DRAIN GRANT APPEAL – 26 BLACK CREEK BOULEVARD.

<u>City Clerk (York Community Council)</u> (July 10, 2000)

Advising that the York Community Council, on June 20, 2000, recommended to the Works Committee that the claim in the amount of \$1,316.10 for blocked drain repairs be allowed to the owner of 26 Black Creek Boulevard, having regard that the roots from a privately-owned tree at 28 Black Creek Boulevard caused the sewer blockage on City property which resulted in the blocked drain at 26 Black Creek Boulevard.

5. DRAIN GRANT APPEAL – 226 GEOFFREY STREET.

Ms. Ines Colabrese <u>Toronto, Ontario</u> (July 28, 2000)

Appealing the decision by the City to pay only half the total amount of repairs to her home sewage connection as a result of a City-owned tree; and requesting reimbursement of the full amount of the repairs.

6. DRAIN GRANT APPEAL – 56 RIVERCREST ROAD.

Mr. Nik Mizdrak, <u>Toronto, Ontario</u> (June 7, 2000)

Appealing the decision by the City in denying reimbursement for the replacement of a sewer pipe under the Drain Grant Program; and advising that a City-owned tree on his neighbours' property caused the blockage.

7. REPLACEMENT OF WATERMAIN/ SEWER CONNECTIONS - 532 MAIN STREET.

Councillor Michael Prue, East York (August 31, 2000)

Forwarding correspondence from Demetrios and Angela Litsas, whose home at 532 Main Street, Toronto, was destroyed as a result of a fire, requiring a complete demolition and rebuilding of the structure, wherein Mr. and Mrs. Litsas request that, in view of the unique circumstances, City Council consider waiving or reducing the cost connected with replacement of the watermain/sewer pipes.

8. REDWAY ROAD/BRENTCLIFFE ROAD EXTENSIONS – FEASIBILITY STUDY RESULTS. (East York)

DEPUTATION ITEM – SCHEDULED FOR 11:30 a.m.

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (August 23, 2000)

- the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services be authorized to prepare a Class Environmental Assessment for an extension of Redway Road between Millwood Road and Bayview Avenue;
- (2) the City not protect lands within the former Alcatel Wire site for an extension of Brentcliffe Road, south of Wicksteed Avenue for a future connection with Redway Road;

- (3) the extension of Redway Road north-easterly to Eglinton Avenue East be maintained as a future network opportunity for implementation; and
- (4) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

9. A 3Rs IMPLEMENTATION PLAN FOR THE CITY OF TORONTO.

DEPUTATION ITEM – SCHEDULED FOR 2:00 p.m.

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (September 1, 2000)

Recommending that in order to achieve the City's waste diversion target of 50 percent by 2006 and to reduce reliance on landfill, City Council authorize the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services to undertake the following integrated activities:

- (1) Intensify the use of existing recycling and composting programs to divert an estimated 50,000 additional tonnes of materials per year by:
 - (i) adding polycoat containers (e.g., milk cartons and aseptic drink boxes), empty paint cans, and empty aerosol cans to the Blue Box Program effective March 1, 2001, retrofitting the Commissioners Street Material Recovery Facility to allow for the recovery, storage and baling of polycoat containers at a capital cost of \$100,000.00, and creating a public communications campaign to launch the new materials, subject to approval of \$100,000.00 in the 2001 Operating Budget;
 - (ii) developing a detailed plan for the potential implementation of year-round once per week curbside collection of recyclable materials and weekly summer time collection of yard waste, including projected increases in the volumes of recovered materials, and report to the Works Committee as part of the 2001 Operating Budget request on the cost and required phasein cashflow to support such enhanced programs;
 - (iii) retrofitting two rental apartments in the downtown core with automated chute systems for garbage, fibre and containers to determine the impact on recycling levels at a cost of \$40,000.00, subject to matching funding from the Waste Diversion Organization and subject to approval of funding in the 2001 Operating Budget;
 - (iv) hiring eight summer students in 2001 to visit targeted apartment buildings receiving municipal recycling collection to review performance and to make recommendations for improved performance of existing systems at an estimated cost of the study of \$50,000.00, subject to approval in the 2001 Operating Budget;

- (v) continuing to seek opportunities to ensure that the City through its own facilities and those of its agencies is optimizing its waste diversion activity, and co-ordinating a corporate report as part of the 2001 Operating Budget process on the benefits of achieving the 50 percent diversion target, and on any financial implications;
- (vi) continuing to explore any and all opportunities through the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, the Waste Diversion Organization and the Provincial Government to enhance product stewardship, including the pursuit of deposit/return systems, mandatory use of recyclable product packaging, and any other measures which will reduce the waste stream;
- (2) Enhance the level of knowledge on public opinion, system cost impacts and market capacity related to options for increased waste diversion by:
 - (i) conducting a series of focus groups, a broad-based public attitude survey, consultation with environmental groups, presentation to the Sustainability Roundtable, public deputations at the 3R's Committee, and community forums to determine what changes Toronto residents and business would be prepared to make to increase waste diversion including the various methodologies for source separation and the potential for financial incentives to impact on behaviour, at an estimated cost of \$60,000.00 and report to the February Works Committee with findings;
 - (ii) based on the findings from the foregoing Recommendation No. 2(i), developing a consultation and communications strategy to encourage an increased rate of residential recycling activity and an implementation strategy for kitchen waste diversion for consideration by the Works Committee at its February meeting and as part of the 2001 Operating Budget Request;
 - (iii) conducting an eight-month project in 2001 to test the co-collection of organic kitchen waste and garbage in two-compartment automated collection carts from 2,400 single family households in the York Community Council Area, using a dual compartment fully automated collection truck to be supplied and operated by Miller Waste Systems at a net cost of \$254,000.00 after funding by the Waste Diversion Organization, subject to approval of funding in the 2001 Operating Budget;
 - (iv) engaging consultants to prepare a comprehensive market assessment study for restricted and unrestricted compost at a cost of \$15,000.00, subject to matching funding from the Waste Diversion Organization; and

- (v) reporting back to the Works Committee on the experience with the recently approved pilot project for separate collection or organic waste from commercial establishments with recommendations on the continuance/expansion of the program as part of the 2001 Operating Budget process; and
- (3) Expand the City's waste diversion capacity by up to an estimated 350,000 tonnes per year of input in order to achieve up to 250,000 tonnes of diversion per year by:
 - (i) completing the first phase of the Dufferin Mixed Waste Recycling and Organics Processing Facility for up to 25,000 tonnes of annual input capacity as soon as possible under the capital funding already approved, assessing its operation, developing recommendations of expansion of the facility up to 165,000 tonnes of input capacity and reporting to the Works Committee as part of the 2002 Capital Budget process thereon;
 - (ii) conducting a study, in co-operation with Enwave District Energy Ltd., on the feasibility of siting an anaerobic digestion facility on City-owned property which would process municipal waste to generate biogas for the district energy needs of the downtown core, and report back to the Works Committee in July, 2001 on the findings of the feasibility study and with recommendations on how to proceed further, subject to approval of funding for the study by the Federation of Canadian Municipalities' "Green Municipal Enabling Fund"; and
 - (iii) entering into negotiations with Miller Waste Systems and the consortium of Groupe Conporec and Services Matrec for the design, construction and operation of aerobic composting facilities for mixed waste and/or sourceseparated organic material, and reporting back to the Works Committee in January with the results of the negotiations and for consideration of the financial implications as part of the 2001 Capital and Operating Budget processes.

12. THREE CONTAINER OR BAG LIMIT FOR RESIDENTIAL SOLID WASTE COLLECTION.

Councillor Bill Saundercook, <u>Chair, Work Committee</u> (August 24, 2000)

Recommending that:

- (1) Works Committee amend the proposed residential solid waste by-law such that "no more than three garbage containers or bags will be picked up on each collection day per residential dwelling unit";
- (2) staff provide for the following exemptions for residents:
 - (i) bulky item collection will continue under current standards;
 - (ii) the one tonne exemption per household at the transfer station continue, preventing residents that move or renovate from being unduly burdened by this by-law; and
 - (iii) each resident be allowed two further collection day exemptions per year, one during the winter holiday season and a second during April; and
- (3) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

13. RECYCLING AT THE TTC AND COMMERCIAL ESTABLISHMENTS.

City Clerk (August 11, 2000)

Advising that City Council, at its meeting on August 1, 2, 3 and 4, 2000, had before it Clause No. 6 contained in Report No. 15 of The Works Committee, headed "Recycling at the TTC and Commercial Establishments", wherein the Works Committee recommended the adoption of the report dated June 30, 2000, from the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services which recommended that OMG three-compartment litter bins be placed in the vicinity of all Toronto Transit Commission subway station entrances, in order to allow Transit commuters the opportunity to recycle away from home; and further advising that Council directed that the aforementioned Clause be struck out and referred back to the Works Committee for further consideration; and that the General Secretary of the Toronto Transit Commission was requested to submit the comments of the Commission to the Works Committee with respect thereto.

14. ADDITIONAL LITTER BINS.

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (August 25, 2000)

Recommending that authority be granted to use the OMG three-compartment litter bins with advertising when placing additional litter bins throughout the City.

15. AUTOMATED "FLOWER POT" WASTE COLLECTION SYSTEM.

<u>City Clerk (North York Community Council)</u> (July 25, 2000)

Advising that North York Community Council, on July 18, 2000, recommended to the Works Committee the adoption of the report (July 12, 2000) from the General Manager, Solid Waste Management Services, which recommended that:

- (1) a pilot study be conducted in the Wilson Street and Dufferin Avenue area to test the effectiveness of removing the large 300 gallon automated "flower pot" waste containers from the City boulevard and replacing them with 95 gallon roll-out carts;
- (2) property owners in the pilot area be advised that they will be responsible for keeping their carts clean, for rolling them out on collection day and then rolling them back out of public view and away from the curb soon after collection, and to place all of their waste materials into the carts and not on the ground; and
- (3) property owners in the pilot area be advised that failure to comply with the above requirements may result in the City terminating their municipal waste collection.

16. OPERATION OF MATERIAL RECOVERY FACILITY AT 400 COMMISSIONERS STREET -CONTRACT No. 00FS-30SW, TENDER CALL No. 175-2000. (Don River)

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services and Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer (August 29, 2000)

Recommending that:

(1) authority be granted to enter into an agreement with Turtle Island Recycling Company Inc., being the lowest bid price in the expected tonnage range and lowest overall total system cost, based on their tender for Contract No. 00FS-30SW, Tender Call No. 175-2000, for the operation of the Material Recovery Facility at 400 Commissioners Street for a period of three years commencing on January 1, 2000, and terminating on December 31, 2003, with an option to extend the contract for a further period of up to 24 months on a month-by-month basis at the sole discretion of the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services at the tendered unit price, including GST, of \$64.75 per tonne of material marketed, subject to the adjustments allowed for in the contract; and

(2) the appropriate officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

17. COLLECTION OF CONTAINERIZED WASTE, BULKY ITEMS AND RECYCLABLES FROM APARTMENT BUILDINGS, TOWNHOUSE LOCATIONS AND MUNICIPAL, INSTITUTIONAL AND COMMERCIAL ESTABLISHMENTS IN DISTRICTS 1 AND 2 -CONTRACT No. 95-2000.

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services and Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer (August 29, 2000)

- authority be granted to enter into a contract for the collection of containerized waste, bulky items and recyclables for Toronto Area A, commencing June 18, 2001, and terminating June 30, 2007, which Canadian Waste Services Inc., being the lowest tender received for these operations, at total annual estimated amount of \$2,038,839.00;
- (2) authority be granted to enter into a contract for the collection of containerized waste, bulky items and recyclables in Etobicoke Area D, commencing July 10, 2002, and terminating June 30, 2007, and for the collection of bulky items and recyclables in York Area B, commencing June 18, 2001, and terminating June 30, 2007, with Recycle Plus Ltd., being the lowest tender received for these operations, at a total annual estimated amount of \$1,143,152.00;
- (3) authority be granted to enter into a contract for the collection of front end load containerized waste for York Area B, commencing June 18, 2001, and terminating June 30, 2007, and for the collection of front end load containerized waste and bulky items in East York Area C, commencing November 1, 2001, and terminating June 30, 2007, with J&F Waste Systems Inc., being the lowest tender received for these operations, at a total annual estimated cost of \$474,245.00; and
- (4) the appropriate officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary actions to give effect thereto.

18. OPTIONS FOR PROVIDING DOOR-TO-DOOR COLLECTION OF SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT SERVICES TO ALL TOWNHOUSE LOCATIONS.

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (August 29, 2000)

Providing options and financial implications of providing door-to-door garbage and recycling collection services to all townhouse locations currently receiving alternate forms of collection, as requested by North York Community Council at its meeting on May 23, 2000; concluding that based on the analysis presented in this report, the provision of door-to-door garbage collection to townhouse locations with vehicular access will increase service levels for the customers at these locations, but will increase overall operating costs and require substantial capital expenditures; and recommending that this report be received for information.

19. WASTE DIVERSION ORGANIZATION UPDATE.

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (August 25, 2000)

Providing the Committee with an update on the progress of the Waste Diversion Organization, as requested by the Committee; advising that the recommendations of the WDO, if approved, will bring financial stability to the Blue Box Program and provide incentives to increase recovery of recyclable material, HHW and organic waste; noting that it will be important for Toronto to indicate to the Minister its strong support for the WDO recommendations in order to ensure that Toronto's portion of the industry funding is received as soon as possible; and recommending that this report be received for information.

20. GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS REDUCTION TRADING.

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (August 30, 2000)

Recommending that:

(1) in the absence of federal and/or provincial regulations on greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions trading, the City of Toronto adopt the existing methodologies of the Pilot Emissions Reduction Trading (PERT) project as a guide to documenting and registering Emission Reduction Credits (ERCs);

- (2) the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services in consultation with other effected departments, register and bank ERCs on an ongoing basis in a manner that will strategically position the City's ERCs in the future;
- (3) the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services in consultation with other effected departments be authorized to execute a demonstration trade not to exceed 5,000 tonnes of CO_2 ERCs for its learning value and not to compromise the City's goal of improving the environment, and that staff be authorized to proceed with such a trade;
- (4) the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services in consultation with other effected departments develop a Corporate Emissions Management and Trading Policy and report back to the Works Committee; and
- (5) the appropriate City officials are granted the authority to give effect thereto.

21. CONSTRUCTION OF COGENERATION FACILITIES -HUMBER TREATMENT PLANT -CONTRACT No. WPC-11-97.

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (August 30, 2000)

Recommending that authority be granted to:

- (1) terminate Contract No. WPC-11-97, Humber Treatment Plant, Construction of the Cogeneration Facilities, with Comstock Canada Ltd., as of July 31, 2000, with work to this date having a value of \$16,950,490.30 including GST; and

45. RESCISSION OF NORTHBOUND AND EASTBOUND LEFT-TURN PROHIBITIONS AT ISLINGTON AVENUE AND SAYBROOK AVENUE/DRIVEWAY TO 1088 ISLINGTON AVENUE. (Lakeshore-Queensway)

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (August 11, 2000)

Recommending that:

- (1) the northbound and eastbound left-turn prohibitions at the intersection of Islington Avenue and Saybrook Avenue/Driveway to 1088 Islington Avenue be rescinded; and

- (2) eastbound right-turn traffic from Steeles Avenue West to Village Gate be prohibited, from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m., Monday to Friday;
- (3) westbound left-turn traffic from Steeles Avenue West to Village Gate be prohibited, from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m., Monday to Friday; and
- (4) the appropriate by-law(s) be amended accordingly.

47. ADJUSTMENTS TO ON-STREET PARKING METER HOURS OF OPERATION.

President, <u>Toronto Parking Authority</u> (August 29, 2000)

Recommending that the current hours of operation for parking meters located in Rate Zone C areas be reduced to operate for a maximum period of two hours between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Monday to Saturday (except where peak hour parking restrictions apply), with the exception of those areas which shall be the subject of further study as set out in this report.

48. OLD WESTON ROAD BRIDGE AREA TRANSPORTATION STUDY. (High Park, Davenport)

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (August 24, 2000)

Presenting the results of a study that reviewed existing and anticipated future traffic conditions in the Old Weston Road area and that identified and evaluated solutions to address identified problems, with a focus on the north-south corridor over the CP Rail Galt Subdivision; advising that an analysis of the existing conditions at intersections within the study area found that operating plans are generally limited to specific movements at isolated intersections, and would be addressed by minor operational and physical improvements to be evaluated for inclusion in future Transportation Services programs, subject to competing priorities; further advising that in order to address longer-term operational deficiencies, larger scale improvements would be required, but that the reinstatement of the Old Weston Road bridge is not a cost-effective solution; and recommending that this report be received for information.

49. INSTALLATION OF FENCING ALONG CN RAIL TRACKS BETWEEN COXWELL AVENUE AND GAINSBOROUGH ROAD. (Ward 9, New Ward 15)

Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services (August 25, 2000)

Respecting the installation of a noise barrier along CN rail tracks between Coxwell Avenue and Gainsborough Road; advising that a sound barrier as outlined therein at a cost of \$750,000.00 could provide some attenuation to adjacent residential properties, but could result in requests from other neighbourhoods for similar sound barriers, potential

resulting in significant additional capital and operating costs to the City; and recommending that this report be received for information.

50. RECONSTRUCTION OF VAUGHAN ROAD AND ARLINGTON AVENUE INTERSECTION.

Advising that Council, at its meeting on August 1, 2, 3, and 4, 2000, referred to the Works Committee a Motion by Councillor Kelly, seconded by Councillor Duguid, wherein it is resolved that:

- (1) all By-law Enforcement Officers, regardless of Department, be immediately directed to remove posters and signs;
- (2) all By-law Enforcement Officers ensure that illegally posted signs that go up in the future are also removed; and
- (3) the Works and Emergency Services Department co-operate with the Municipal Licensing and Standards Division and provide the equipment that is necessary to take down illegal posters and signs.
