**Confirmation of Minutes.**

On motion by Councillor Prue, the Minutes of the meeting of the Board of Health held on Monday, June 26, 2000, were confirmed.

**7.1 Influenza Immunization for  
City of Toronto Employees.**

The Board of Health had before it a report (July 11, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health, reporting on options for influenza immunization of City of Toronto employees; advising the financial impact of providing influenza immunization to City employees involves the cost of providing immunization clinics at City worksites and the cost of providing vaccine for those employees who are not eligible to receive it free from the Province; further that the cost of administering influenza immunization for city employees (excluding City Agencies, Boards and Commissions) is estimated at approximately \$187,064 annually; that funds for this program are not included in the approved allocation for Employee Health Services, Corporate Services budget and cannot be absorbed within the approved allocation; that influenza prevention in the 2000/2001 winter season will require employee immunization and associated expenditure of funds beginning in the fall of 2000; and further that funds for this purpose can be provided on a one-time only basis through a reallocation of under-expenditures in the Public Health Program; that on-going expenses for this initiative should be considered in the 2001 operating budget process for Employee Health Services and that Provincial cost-sharing for this initiative will be sought; that the Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer has reviewed this report and concurs with the financial impact statement, and recommending that:

- (1) the City of Toronto Employee Health Services offer influenza vaccination at no charge to all city employees beginning in the fall of 2000;
- (2) Employee Health Services contract out the provision of on-site influenza immunization clinics across the city;
- (3) City Council approve the expenditure of \$187,064 to provide influenza immunization to City employees;
- (4) the estimated cost of this program be absorbed within the 2000 approved Operating Budget within Public Health and that a report be submitted to the Policy and Finance Committee on details of this expenditure and the under-expenditures in 2000 that may be re-allocated for this purpose, as part of the 2000 Operating Budget Variance reporting process;
- (5) the Board of Health urge the Ontario Ministry of Health to include influenza vaccination for municipal employees in its Mandatory Health Programs and Services Guidelines, and that the Ministry of Health provide free influenza vaccine for this purpose and 50:50 cost-sharing of immunization expenses;
- (6) the Board of Health refer this report to Policy and Finance Committee for its consideration;

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- (7) the Board of Health refer this report to the Occupational Health and Safety Communicable Disease Control Policy Workgroup for information; and
- (8) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

Councillor King moved that the foregoing report from the Medical Officer of Health be adopted, subject to adding a further recommendation to provide that for subsequent years, funding for this program be provided from appropriate Operating Budget, for example, from Human Resources Division and not from the Toronto Public Health budget. **Carried.**

Councillor Johnson moved that Toronto Public Health host an “influenza immunization clinic” during a meeting of Council and that Members of Council, employees, and the media be invited to such clinic. **Carried.**

***To summarize, the Board of Health took the following action:***

The Board of Health:

- (i) recommended to Policy and Finance Committee:
  - (A) adoption of the following Recommendations Nos. (1) through (4) embodied in the report (July 11, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health:

“It is recommended that:

    - (1) the City of Toronto Employee Health Services offer influenza vaccination at no charge to all city employees beginning in the fall of 2000;
    - (2) Employee Health Services contract out the provision of on-site influenza immunization clinics across the City;
    - (3) City Council approve the expenditure of \$187,064.00 to provide influenza immunization to City employees;
    - (4) the estimated cost of this program be absorbed within the 2000 approved Operating Budget within Public Health and that a report

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be submitted to the Policy and Finance Committee on details of this expenditure and the under-expenditures in 2000 that may be re-allocated for this purpose, as part of the 2000 Operating Budget Variance reporting process;”

- (B) for subsequent years, funding for the influenza immunization program for all City employees be provided from an appropriate Operating Budget, for example, from the Human Resources Division, and not from the Toronto Public Health budget;
  - (C) Toronto Public Health host an “influenza immunization clinic” during a meeting of Council and that Members of Council, employees, and the media be invited to such clinic;
  - (D) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect to the foregoing; and
- (ii) adopted Recommendations Nos. (5), (6) and (7) embodied in the foregoing report from the Medical Officer of Health.

## **7.2 Bill S-20 – The Tobacco Youth Protection Act.**

The Board of Health had before it a report (July 11, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health, informing the Board of Health of Bill S-20, the Tobacco Youth Protection Act and to seek endorsement of this bill by the Board of Health and City Council, in view of the Bill's potential contribution to Toronto's Comprehensive Tobacco Use Reduction Strategy; advising there are no financial implications; and recommending that:

- (1) the Board of Health and City Council endorse Bill S-20, the Tobacco Youth Protection Act, and request the Prime Minister, the Federal Minister of Health and all Toronto area Members of Parliament to support passage of Bill S-20 by the House of Commons; and
- (2) this report be forwarded to all Boards of Health in Ontario for similar endorsement and advocacy with their federal Members of Parliament.

On motion by Trustee Gershon, the Board of Health recommended to Council the adoption of the foregoing report (July 11, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health subject to amending Recommendation No. (2) to provide that the report also be forwarded to all Boards of Education in Ontario.

**7.3 A Standardized Approach to the Delivery of Public Health Services in Schools.**

The Board of Health had before it a report (July 12, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health, proposing a model for the delivery of Public Health Services in schools to ensure consistent access to Public Health services City-wide; advising that there are no financial implications for year 2000; and recommending that:

- (1) the Board of Health endorse the “Comprehensive School Health (CSH)” model for the delivery of public health services in schools;
- (2) that the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary steps to give effect thereto; and
- (3) that this report be forwarded to the Children Youth and Action Committee for information.

On motion by Trustee Gershon, the Board of Health:

- (1) adopted the foregoing report from the Medical Officer of Health subject to amending Recommendation No. (3) to provide that the report also be forwarded to Toronto School Board officials; and
- (2) requested the Medical Officer of Health to submit a report to the Board on any suggested modifications that are received subsequent to the distribution of the foregoing report.

#### **7.4 Lakeview Generating Station – Health and Environmental Impacts.**

The Board of Health had before it a report (July 7, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health, providing a response to Council's request respecting the potential health and environmental impacts associated with the selling of the Lakeview Generating Station; advising that there are no direct financial implications for the City of Toronto and recommending that the Board of Health:

- (1) strongly recommend to the Premier of Ontario and to the Ontario Minister of the Environment that they require full conversion of the Lakeview Generating Station to natural gas within two years whether or not it is sold; and
- (2) forward this report to the Works Committee as requested by City Council.

The following persons appeared before the Board of Health in connection with the foregoing matter.

- Dr. Keith Steward, Toronto Environmental Alliance, and submitted a written brief with respect thereto; and

Councillor Johnston moved that the Mayor, the Chair of the Board of Health, and the Medical Officer of Health be requested to meet with the Provincial Minister of the Environment. **Failed.**

On motion by Councillor Mihevc, the Board of Health:

- (1) strongly recommended to the Premier of Ontario and to the Ontario Minister of the Environment that:
  - (a) they require full conversion of the Lakeview Generating Station to natural gas within two years whether or not it is sold;
  - (b) all coal-fired generating stations be converted to natural gas;

- (2) requested the Medical Officer of Health and the Chair of the Board of Health to request a meeting with the Provincial Minister of the Environment;
- (3) directed that a copy of the foregoing report be forwarded to:
  - (a) the Federal Minister of the Environment;
  - (b) the Anti-Smog Action Plan Executive Committee; and
- (4) forwarded the foregoing report to the Works Committee as requested by Council.

## **7.5 Food Premises Inspections Blitz.**

The Board of Health had before it a report (July 11, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health, reporting on the findings of the food premises inspections blitz conducted between February 22 to June 16, 2000; advising that there are no financial implications; and recommending that the Board of Health refer this report to City Council for information.

On motion by Councillor Mihivc, the Board of Health recommended to Council that the foregoing report be received.

## **7.6 Response to Audit Services Report Entitled “Review of Food Safety Program”.**

The Board of Health had before it a report (July 11, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health, responding to the recommendations contained in the City Auditor’s Review of

Food Safety Program report presented to the Board of Health on June 26, 2000; advising that there are no financial implications; and recommending that this report be received for information.

On motion by Councillor Jones, the Board of Health received the foregoing report for information.

#### **7.7 Variance Report to June 2000.**

The Board of Health had before it a report (July 21, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health, reporting on the year-to-date financial information to June, 2000 and to outline the significant variances and service impacts; advising that there are no financial implications; and recommending that this report be received for information.

On motion by Mr. Davies, the Board of Health received the foregoing report.

#### **7.8 Community Roundtables on Health.**

The Board of Health had before it a report (July 10, 2000) from Councillor Irene Jones, Vice-Chair, and Mr. Lee Zaslofsky, Member, Board of Health, reporting on the four Community Roundtables on Health held on April 15, 2000 and to recommend the next step in the process of integrating community identification of local health needs into Divisional planning and determining most appropriate mechanisms for community participation with the Board of Health; advising that there are no financial implications and recommending that:

- (1) the Board of Health hold four Community Roundtables on Health on September 11, 2000 to contribute to the process of integrating community identification of local health needs into Divisional planning and to determine most appropriate mechanisms for community participation with the Board of Health; and
- (2) the appropriate City Officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

On motion by Councillor Jones, the Board of Health adopted the foregoing report.

## **7.9 Purchases of Services Contracts.**

The Board of Health had before it a report (July 11, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health, addressed to the Board of Health and the Policy and Finance Committee, reporting on a process that will confirm the authority of the Medical Officer of Health to both award and execute purchase of service contracts for the Preschool Speech and Language program, the Healthy Babies, Healthy Children program, the Sexual Health and AIDS prevention programs, and the Child Nutrition Program, in consultation with the Purchasing and Materials Management Division and the City Solicitor; advising that there are no financial implications; further advising that the Preschool Speech and Language program and the Healthy Babies, Healthy Children program are funded 100 percent by the Ministry of Health. Sexual Health program components are 50 percent cost shared, with the exception of two sexual health contracts totalling \$100,000.00 that are 100 percent Ministry of Health funded; that funding for the respective purchase of service contracts has been approved in the 2000 Operating Budget; that the Treasurer and Chief Financial Officer has reviewed and concurs with the financial impact statement; and recommending that:

- (1) authority be granted to the Medical Officer of Health to award the purchase of service contracts related to the programs named in this report, such purchase of service agencies to be selected in accordance with specific selection criteria as described in the report;
- (2) authority be granted to the Medical Officer of Health to both award and execute, on an ongoing annual basis, the purchase of service contracts for the programs named in this report, within the Toronto Public Health approved budget;
- (3) authority be granted to the Medical Officer of Health to amend the amount of said purchase of service contracts subject to a prior report to Policy and Finance Committee on changes in provincial funding and/or service targets;
- (4) the Medical Officer of Health ensure accountability of agencies in accordance with program requirements specified in Appendices "A", "B", "C", and "D" in this report; and
- (5) that the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary steps to give effect thereto.

On motion by Councillor Jones, the Board of Health advised Council, for its meeting on August 1, 2000, that it concurs with the recommendations of the Medical Officer of Health embodied in the foregoing report.

**7.10. Drug Prevention and Harm Reduction in  
Regard to Raves.**

The Board of Health had before it a report (July 4, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health, outlining the drug prevention and harm reduction strategies of Toronto Public Health in regard to raves; responding to specific recommendations pertaining to Toronto Public Health from the Inquest Touching the Death of Allen Ho; advising that there are no financial implications and recommending that:

- (1) the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care organize a network of public health units throughout Ontario to develop educational strategies targeted at the drug use problems in the community;
- (2) Toronto Public Health continue to support vehicles for peer-based interventions for promoting safe, healthy practices at raves, including the Toronto Raver Info Project and the Toronto Dance Safety Committee as outlined in the Protocol for the Operation of Safe Dance Events;
- (3) the Board of Health include rave health education as a priority for the Drug Abuse Prevention Grants Review Panel, with a contribution in 2001 from the City of Toronto Consolidated Grants Budget, Public Health Line, of \$20,000.00, and further contributions of funds from the promoters of each rave, based on the size of the rave, in lieu of the \$0.50 per ticket surtax suggested by the Inquest;
- (4) Toronto Public Health develop culturally appropriate print, radio, television, and Internet health promotion materials to promote safe, healthy practices at raves, in partnership with the Centre for Addictions and Mental Health and the private sector, as part of its ongoing substance abuse strategy;
- (5) the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care support and finance blood testing in drug overdose cases reported to emergency departments in order to add to the accuracy of reporting on the pattern of drug use in the community; and support hospital emergency departments to implement systems that would make it easier to extract information on drug overdoses from their records and make that information available to public health units;
- (6) this report be referred to City Council for consideration at its meeting on August 1, 2, and 3, 2000; and
- (7) that the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary steps to give effect thereto.

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The Board of Health also had before it a communication (July 7, 2000) from the Committee Secretary, Substance Abuse Subcommittee, advising that the Substance Abuse Sub-Committee, on July 7, 2000, recommended to the Board of Health the adoption of the report (June 29, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health respecting drug prevention and harm reduction in regard to raves, subject to:

- (1) amending Recommendation No. (1) by adding the words “and boards of education” after the words “a network of public health units” and by adding the words “including primary prevention and outreach to parents” after the words “drug use problems in the community”, so that such recommendation shall now read as follows:
  - “(1) the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care organize a network of public health units and boards of education throughout Ontario to develop educational strategies targeted at the drug use problems in the community including primary prevention and outreach to parents;” and
- (2) adding the following additional recommendations:
  - “(8) raves be permitted on City owned property if they comply with:
    - (a) the applicable recommendations contained in this report;
    - (b) the protocol for the safe operation of a rave as approved in 1999 by City Council; and
    - (c) any further requirements that may be approved by City Council after consultation with the Toronto Dance Safety Committee;
  - (9) City Council consider developing protocols for other similar kinds of events; and
  - (10) the Board of Health advocate to the Ministry of Education and Training to provide funding for the development of a substance use and abuse unit of study as part of the Grade 11 and 12 course profiles for the healthy living strand of the health and physical education curriculum.”

The Medical Officer of Health advised that the Ministry of the Environment has jurisdiction with respect to air quality and that Toronto Public Health officials have been in contact with both staff of the Ministry and the owner of the autobody shop and that the Ministry has taken air samples in the area.

- (4) forward this report to the Ontario Minister of the Environment and the Ontario Minister of Energy, Science and Technology.

**7.16 Not to Kids – Portal Youth Tobacco Web Enhancement Project.**

The Board of Health had before it a report (July 24, 2000) from the Medical Officer of Health, to authorize the Toronto Public Health and the City's participation in the Not to Kids – Portal Youth Tobacco Web Enhancement Project; that the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care is providing 100 percent funding to the partnership project, in the amount of \$25,400.00; that there are therefore no direct financial implications for the City of Toronto; and recommending that:



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- (1) the Board of Health request City Council that the Toronto Public Health and the City be authorized to participate in the Not to Kids—Portal Youth Tobacco Web Enhancement Project and that the City be authorized to enter into any necessary agreements required for purposes of the Project; and
- (2) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the actions necessary to give effect thereto.

On motion by Councillor Prue, the Board of Health recommended to Council that:

- (1) Toronto Public Health be authorized to participate in the Not to Kids—Portal Youth Tobacco Web Enhancement Project (the “Project”);
- (2) the Medical Officer of Health be authorized to enter into any necessary agreements required for the purposes of the Project; and
- (3) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect to the foregoing.

**(Clause No. 4, Report No. 6)**
