- (a) recommended to the Budget Advisory Committee the adoption of the recommendations contained in the recommended 2001-2005 Capital Program for Toronto Emergency Medical Services; and
- (b) requested the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services and the General Manager, Toronto Emergency Medical Services to report to the Community Services Committee on the status of each individual project in the Capital Program;

(II) Fire Services:

recommended to the Budget Advisory Committee the adoption of the recommendations contained in the recommended 2001-2005 Capital Program for Fire Services;

Community and Neighbourhood Services:

(III) Children's Services:

recommended to the Budget Advisory Committee the adoption of the recommendations contained in the recommended 2001-2005 Capital Program for Children's Services;

(IV) Homes for the Aged:

- (b) deferring the Site Redevelopment Project for True Davidson Acres until the period 2004-2006, providing the new Home for the Aged in Scarborough is approved;

and further that the Budget Advisory Committee be advised of the Community Services Committee's support for the Site Redevelopment Project for Albion Lodge;

(V) Shelter, Housing and Support:

- (a) recommended to the Budget Advisory Committee the adoption of the recommendations contained in the recommended 2001-2005 Capital Program for Shelter, Housing and Support;
- (b) requested the Commissioner of Corporate Services to report to the Budget Advisory Committee on the listing price for 717 Broadview Avenue; and
- (c) requested the Commissioner of Community and Neighbourhood Services, in consultation with community stakeholders and experts, to prepare a revised forecast on the capital needs for new shelter beds which reflects an increase in the City's homeless population, and report thereon to the Community Services Committee by the summer of 2001.

Advising that the Community Services Committee at its meetings held on February 22 and 26, 2001, reviewed the 2001 Operating Budgets under its purview, and took the following action in regard thereto:

Works and Emergency Services:

- (I) Toronto Emergency Medical Services:
 - (a) recommended to the Budget Advisory Committee the recommended 2001 Operating Budget for Toronto Emergency Medical Services in the amount of \$95,197,200.00 gross and \$39,084,600.00 net;
 - (b) requested the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services, in consultation with the General Manager, Toronto Emergency Medical Services, to:
 - (i) consider the option to lease rather than purchase replacement vehicles, and report thereon to the Community Services Committee by May 2001; and
 - (ii) report to the Community Services Committee on the status of the negotiations with the Province of Ontario with respect to the 2000 and 2001 subsidies for Toronto Emergency Medical Services;

(II) Fire Services:

- (a) recommended to the Budget Advisory Committee:
 - (i) the revised 2001 Operating Budget for Fire Services in the amount of \$242,583,800.00 gross and \$238,869,100.00 net, which includes the impact of:
 - (1) the addition of two out-of-service trucks, totalling \$2,800,000.00; and
 - (2) the addition of 55 firefighters, totalling \$2,612,800.00;
 - (ii) that fees for false alarms and elevator calls be increased from \$300.00 to \$350.00 per vehicle, and that the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services be requested to provide the Budget Advisory Committee with an estimate as to the amount of additional revenue this will generate for the City; and
 - (iii) that the fees for highway response be increased to the maximum level of \$350.00, and that the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services provide the Budget Advisory Committee with an estimate as to the amount of additional revenue this will generate for the City;
- (b) requested the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services, in consultation with the Fire Chief, to:
 - (i) consider maximizing revenue generating opportunities, such as utilizing the Fire Services name and logo on clothing, accessories, toys, and other appropriate products, and report thereon to the Community Services Committee by June 2001;
 - (ii) report to the Budget Advisory Committee on potential savings and efficiencies from allowing maintenance of the Fire Services fleet to be administered by Fire Services directly, and that such report include examples of vehicles being out of service for extended periods of time for minor repairs and of overcharging for vehicle maintenance:
 - (iii) consider the option to lease rather than purchase replacement fire services fleet, and report thereon to the Community Services Committee; and

(c) requested the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services to review the Toronto Fire Services management structure and consider opportunities for rationalization following implementation of the Records Management System;

(III) Children's Services:

- (a) recommended to the Budget Advisory Committee:
 - (i) the adoption of the recommendations contained in the recommended 2001 Operating Budget for Children's Services, subject to:
 - (1) reducing such budget by a total of \$14,596,400.00 gross, and \$320,000.00 net, as follows:

Advising that the Toronto Transit Commission at its meeting held on February 27, 2001, approved the following recommendation contained in a staff report dated February 16, 2001, headed "2001 Wheel-Trans Operating Budget":

"It is recommended that the Commission:

- (1) approve the 2001 Wheel-Trans Operating Budget of \$42.8M provided for in this report and companion documents which includes \$42.0M for service and \$3.0M for bus fleet replacement partially offset by revenues of \$2.2M;
- (2) approve the Wheel-Trans Service Plan which encompasses the following key factors:
 - (i) trip demand increasing to 1,503,800;
 - (ii) unaccommodated rate returns to two percent;
 - (iii) 56 percent of trips carried by buses; 44 percent of trips handled by contracted taxi service;
 - (iv) 85 percent of trips provided by accessible vehicles comprised of 132 buses and 62 accessible taxis;
 - (v) overall vehicle productivity improvement to 5.1 passengers per hour through major initiatives such as:
 - (A) introduction of a trial Express Bus Service from Scarborough Town Centre to the downtown core;
 - (B) expanded areas covered by Zone Service;
 - (C) increased integration with conventional Toronto Transit Commission accessible services; and
 - (D) efforts directed at reducing trip cancellations;
 - (vi) overall service quality improvement as measured by 'on-time' delivery of service to 95 percent through major initiatives such as:
 - (A) implementation of a 25 bus tracking trial directed at improving 'same day' service delivery;

- (B) introduction of an automated 'call-back' feature to update customers on trip status; and
- (C) updates to the computer scheduling system (WTIS);
- (vii) continue to accommodate original requested trip times within +30 minutes at 96 percent;
- (viii) improved specialized transit service co-ordination with Greater Toronto Area;
- (viv) new Overland economical low-floor (ELF) buses available for service increase to 104 improving vehicle reliability and reducing maintenance costs; and
- (vv) no increase in workforce;
- (3) consider this report in concert with the following:
 - (i) the 2001 Toronto Transit Commission Operating Budget; and
 - (ii) 2001-2005 Toronto Transit Commission Capital Program which includes \$7.2M for Wheel-Trans of which \$6.3M is allocated to the Orion bus replacement program for the purchase of 30 low-floor ELF buses, and \$0.9M for improved scheduling and service continuity; and
- (4) forward this report to City Council for approval and to the Toronto Transit Commission's Advisory Committee on Accessible Transportation for information;".
