#### **Confirmation of Minutes**

# 3.1 Toronto's Environmental Tobacco Smoke (ETS) By-Law – Designated Smoking Rooms

- (1) City of Toronto Municipal Code Chapter 709 Smoking be amended immediately to further define a Designated Smoking Room as a room to which no patron under the age of 19 years is permitted;
- (2) City of Toronto Municipal Code Chapter 709 Smoking be amended by deleting the exemption for Designated Smoking Rooms in workplaces and public places effective June 1, 2005;
- (3) the City Solicitor be given the authority to prepare and introduce a Bill to Council to give effect to recommendations 1 and 2; and
- (4) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

- (4) the City Solicitor be given the authority to prepare and introduce a Bill in Council to give effect to Recommendations Nos. (1), (2) and (3); and
- (5) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

#### 3.2 West Nile Virus Update

The Board of Health had before it a report (March 31, 2003) from the Medical Officer of Health, providing the Board of Health with an update on Toronto Public Health's West Nile Virus (WNV) Program for 2003 and responding to a number of outstanding issues arising from the Board of Health meetings of November 18, 2002 and January 27, 2003; and also seeking the Board of Health endorsement of the WNV protocol submitted to the January, 2003 Board of Health meeting; and recommending that:

- (1) the Board of Health approve the attached Toronto Public Health WNV Protocol (Appendix A); and
- (2) the appropriate officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary steps to give effect thereto.

    - (ii) catch basin cleaning be implemented in those areas near rivers and creeks and that the use of larvicide not be introduced if possible; and
    - (iii) funding in the amount of \$100,000.00 be reinstated in the budget for the West Nile Virus Program and the Province of Ontario be requested to match this amount; and
  - (2) the Works Committee requested the Commissioner of Works and Emergency Services to submit a

report to the Works Committee on any potential retrofit programs for catch basins.

On motion by Trustee Stefanini the Board of Health also requested the Medical Officer of Health to review the information provided by the Etobicoke Local Health Committee on the West Nile Virus Vaccine and report back to the Board of Health on developments in this field.

#### 3.3 Proposed Pesticide By-law

The Board of Health had before it a report (March 25, 2003) from the Medical Officer of Health, presenting a pesticides by-law similar to the Hudson, Quebec by-law, and to reporting on the experience of other jurisdictions as directed by the Board of Health; and recommending that:

- (1) the Board of Health endorse this report and the attached by-law and forward these to City Council for approval;
- (2) the financial implications summarized in Table 2 related to the implementation of the Pesticide By-law be forwarded to the Budget Advisory Committee and then to the Policy and Finance Committee during the 2004 budget process for their consideration;
- (3) the City Solicitor be authorized to prepare and introduce a Bill in Council in the form or substantially in the form of the draft by-law attached to this report as Appendix "A";
- (4) the Board of Health direct the Medical Officer of Health to report back annually on progress made in achieving pesticide use reductions through the implementation and enforcement of the pesticides by-law;
- (5) City Council request the federal Minister of Health to ensure that regulations made under the *Pest Control Products Act* require annual reporting of pesticides sales data, both by active ingredient and by municipality in which the products are sold, in order to facilitate municipal efforts to monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of pesticide use reduction programs;
- (6) City Council request the federal Minister of Health and the provincial Minister of the Environment to expedite programs presently underway to increase public access to reduced-risk pesticides, restrict public access to high-risk pesticides, improve access to information about the safe use of pesticides, and increase

co-operative efforts through the Healthy Lawn Strategy in order to reduce reliance on lawn care chemicals;

- (7) City Council request the federal Minister of Health and the provincial Minister of the Environment to include the municipal sector as a partner in the Federal/Provincial/ Territorial Committee mandated to provide advice and direction to governments on programs and policies for pesticides with the aim of enhancing sustainable pest control practices;
- (8) City Council request the provincial Minister of the Environment to establish standards for Integrated Pest Management in regulations under the Pesticides Act, and provide that IPM training be required in order to be a licensed exterminator in the Province of Ontario;
- (9) the Board of Health forward this report along with the Medical Officer of Health's report dated November 7, 2002 describing the "Common Ground" strategy to the Works Committee and the Economic Development and Parks Committee for their information;
- (10) the Board of Health forward this report to the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, the Ontario Ministry of the Environment, Health Canada, the Ontario Public Health Association, and the Association of Local Public Health Agencies; and
- (11) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

#### 3.6 Dental Laboratory Services Quotation Request No. 0502-03-0024

The Board of Health had before it a joint report (March 20, 2003) from the Medical Officer of Health, Commissioner of Community and Neighbourhood Services, and the Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer; advising on the results of the Request for Quotation issued for Dental Laboratory Services for the City of Toronto, Toronto Public Health, Dental and Oral Health Services, for the period June 1, 2003 to May 31, 2005

with the option to renew for one (1) additional one (1) year period under the same terms and conditions, in accordance with the specifications required by Toronto Public Health, Dental and Oral Health Services and to request the authority to issue a contract to the recommended bidder; and recommending that:

- (1) the Quotation submitted by the lowest bidder, C & B Dental Laboratories Inc. in the total amount of \$804,000.00 including all charges and applicable taxes for the supply of Dental Laboratory Services be accepted for the period of June 1, 2003 to May 31, 2005;
- the option to renew for one (1) additional one (1) year period, in the estimated amount of \$425,000.00 including all charges and applicable taxes for the supply of Dental Laboratory Services, under the same terms and conditions, and pricing be reviewed by the Commissioner of Community and Neighbourhood Services, in cooperation with the Purchasing Agent to ensure it is feasible to extend the contract, provided the supply of these services were performed at a satisfactory level, and that funds are available in the Public Health operating budget for the two renewal periods; and
- (3) provided that there is a favourable review, in accordance with Recommendation No. 2, the Commissioner of Community and Neighbourhood Services be delegated the authority to exercise the option to renew on the terms and conditions set out above and be authorized to instruct the Purchasing Agent to process the necessary contract.

#### 3.9 Information Systems and Technology – Toronto Public Health

The Board of Health had before it a communication (April 7, 2003) from Councillor David Soknacki with respect to Toronto Public Health Information Systems and Technology.

On motion by Councillor Soknacki, the Board of Health requested the Director, Information and Technology, to conduct an internal review of the state of information systems and technology within Toronto Public Health, and report thereon with recommendations for the Board of Health's meeting on July 14, 2003. This review may include opportunities and recommendations with respect to shared or consolidated infrastructure.

#### 3.10 Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome

The Board of Health received a verbal update from the Medical Officer of Health.

Coucillor Sherene Shaw addressed the Board of Health with respect to this matter.

The Board of Health:

- (1) strongly requested the Provincial government to establish an Assessment Clinic for SARS in the North Scarborough area as soon as possible, since this has been the area most affected by the SARS outbreak and local residents need to get quick access to an assessment clinic; **moved** by Counciller Augimeri on behalf of Councillor Shaw
- (2) requested the Medical Officer of Health to report to the Board of Health, through the Budget Subcommittee on financial and resource implications of dealing with the SARS emergency; **moved** by Councillor Filion
- (3) requested the appropriate officials from the Federal and Provincial governments to meet with Toronto Public Health staff and City finance officials to establish a mechanism to ensure there is sufficient Federal and Provincial funding to cover the City's expenses that directly arise from the Provincially declared SARS emergency; **moved** by Councillor Filion
- (4) requested Toronto Public Health and cooperating agencies concerned with the SARS outbreak to pay particular attention to the social and community impacts on the measures they take and that Toronto Public Health emphasize efforts to reduce negative social, economic, and community effects arising from inappropriate responses to the SARS outbreak; **moved** by Mr. Zaslofsky, and
- (5) extended its appreciation to the Medical Officer of Health and her staff for their hard work and dedication in response to SARS.
