Confirmation of Minutes

On Motion by Mr. Nelson, the Minutes of the meeting of the Toronto Cycling Committee held on April 18, 2005, were confirmed.

5.1 Signage on Kiosks in Parks

Alex Shevchuk, Parks and Recreation Planner, Policy and Development, Parks, Forestry and Recreation Division, made a presentation regarding the present proposals and options for appropriate signage on kiosks in parks in order to provide safety information, as well as directional/guidance signage.

Mr. Shevchuk distributed an information sheet describing the following signage which is being installed or is in the planning process at this time:

- (a) Information Boards
 - (i) Waterfront Regeneration Trust (WRT) Information Boards (Trailhead Signs); and
 - (ii) Further Waterfront Trail Signage;
- (b) Wayfinding/Directional Signage
- (c) Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Emergency Location Signage

On Motion by Ms. Nowak, the Toronto Cycling Committee recommended that the presentation from Alex Shevchuk, Parks and Recreation Planner, Policy and Development, Parks, Forestry and Recreation Division, be received.

5.2 Cycling Trends and Policies in Canadian Cities

Andrew Wood, Member, Toronto Cycling Committee, made a presentation regarding the report (January 30, 2005) from John Pucher and Ralph Buehler, Rutgers University, titled "Cycling Trends and Policies in Canadian Cities".

On motion by Mr. Koob, the Toronto Cycling Committee recommended that the following motion be sent to each Toronto Cycling Committee subcommittee with a request that they provide their comments on the motion to the next Toronto Cycling Committee meeting on June 20, 2005:

"The Toronto Cycling Committee recommends that the Works Committee request City

Council to request the Province to become more deeply involved in cycling issues and provide funding for a range of programs to promote cycling, increase safety, coordinate local cycling efforts and fund infrastructure improvements."

5.3 Policy of Replacing Existing Street Signs

Daniel Egan, Manager, Pedestrian and Cycling Infrastructure, Transportation Services Division, made a presentation regarding the policy of replacing existing street signs.

The Toronto Cycling Committee had before it an extract from the Works Committee Decision Document Meeting 4, advising that the Works Committee at its meeting on April 27, 2005 requested Transportation Services Division to consult with the public and stakeholder groups, such as the Toronto Pedestrian Committee, the Disabilities Issues Committee, the Seniors' Assembly, and the Toronto Cycling Committee, on the street name sign replacement policy and report back to the Works Committee meeting on June 29, 2005.

On Motion by Mr. Lafontaine, the Toronto Cycling Committee recommended that the presentation from Daniel Egan, Manager, Pedestrian and Cycling Infrastructure, Transportation Services Division, be received.

5.4 Reconstruction of Royal York Road between Mimico Creek and Usher Avenue – Pavement Width

The Toronto Cycling Committee had before it a communication (April 27, 2005) from the City Clerk advising of the following actions taken by the Works Committee on April 27, 2005:

Action taken by the Committee:

The Works Committee requested:

- (a) the Acting General Manager, Transportation Services to report to the Toronto Cycling Committee and the Works Committee on:
 - (i) the inclusion of a 1.25 metre signed bike route, identified by an edge line, on each side of Royal York Road between Mimico Creek and Usher Avenue

within the recommended 9.1 metre pavement width; and

- (ii) since the City is encouraging cyclists to use Royal York Road, whether marking the road would provide a higher level of protection for cyclists than no marking;
- (b) the City Solicitor to report to the Toronto Cycling Committee and the Works Committee on the legalities and the risk factors if the City marks the edge line on Royal York Road below the standard for bicycle lanes; and
- (c) the Acting General Manager, Transportation Services to report to the Etobicoke York Community Council for its meeting on May 3, 2005, with a request that they report to Council on May 17, 2005, on the implementation of bicycle lanes on Stephen Drive and Norseman Road, west of Royal York Road, during reconstruction in 2006; and that this matter be considered with the Royal York Road reconstruction project.

On Motion by Mr. Koob, the Toronto Cycling Committee recommends that:

- (1) the communication (April 27, 2005) from the City Clerk, advising of the actions taken by the Works Committee on April 27, 2005, be received; and
- (2) the Works Committee be advised of the extreme disappointment of the Toronto Cycling Committee regarding the Works Committee support for a road width of 9.1 metres on Royal York Road rather than a road width of 9.4 metres.

- (3) the use <u>bikeaware@sympatico.ca</u> as a tool to organize people to participate in bicycle-related public meetings be endorsed and the following statement, which will be used by Bike Aware User Group, be received for information:
 - "The Bike Aware Bicycle User Group is seeking volunteers to increase the visibility of cycling issues at community meetings. Of particular importance, are speakers at meetings discussing bike lanes, which frequently are opposed by small but vocal groups in the communities where the lanes are planned. Often many community members who would support making their community more bicycle friendly are not aware that the issue is being decided upon, nor how they can have their say in the decision. It is our hope to show that there are cyclists and others in these communities who support the installation of lanes and other measures to improve the cycling environment. Two types of volunteers are needed:
 - (1) People from all areas of the city to attend community meetings. If you are interested even if you can only occasionally make it out to a meeting, please send your name, contact details and location area within the city to bikeaware@sympatico.ca. Bike Aware will keep track of volunteers, inform you of any meetings coming up within your area of the city and provide you, when possible, with information on the issue to be discussed; and
 - (2) News monitors. In order to keep up to date on what is going on around the city; Bike Aware would like to have volunteers to monitor local community newspapers. Whenever an article or advertisement discusses a cycling issue or announces a community meeting on issue that affects cyclists, the item needs to be clipped and sent to Bike Aware. These items will be used both to keep up to date on what's going and to track changing trends in media coverage of cycling issues. If you regularly read your local newspapers, please forward your name and the name of the papers in your neighbourhood to the Bike Aware email address.";
- (4) a September 2005 Toronto Cycling Committee member drive be held identifying people who would like to join the Toronto Cycling Committee in January 2006; and
- (5) a meeting be set-up between Toronto Police Service, the Toronto Cycling Committee, and Councillor Adam Giambrone's office, to discuss the media outreach component of the 2005 'Cycle Right' campaign.

"DRAFT FOR CONSIDERATION:

Dear

On behalf of the Toronto Cycling Committee, I would like to advise you that the City of Toronto's Bike Week will take place from May 30 to June 12, 2005, featuring over 120 cycling-related events taking place across the city.

I would like to encourage you, in your capacity as a school trustee, to take part in one or more of these events, and in particular, to use this period of increased cycling awareness, to support cycling in our schools whenever possible. It can be a viable alternative to many trips made by automobile. Cycling is also an excellent way to promote healthy activity and fitness, especially at a time when childhood obesity is a growing health concern.

The promotion of safety is an integral part of encouraging more bicycle use by our youth. The Toronto Police have a number of programs available to provide enhanced cycling safety information. There are several organizations that provide enhanced cycling safety information, including the Ministry of Transportation and Riskwatch. The City of Toronto offers CAN-BIKE courses, which teach safe and effective cycling and traffic interaction skills. The City's Cycling Ambassadors also promote safe cycling messages at public events in Toronto. In order to obtain information or arrange for a safe cycling presentation, please contact the City of Toronto at (416) 392-_____.

Basic cycling safety stresses the importance of visibility at all times, through the wearing of light and bright clothing and the use of lights and reflectors; riding predictably and following traffic rules; and wearing a correctly-fitted helmet (required by law for those under the age of 18). As well, teen and adult cyclists should ride on the road, with traffic, as riding on the sidewalk is illegal and hazardous to both cyclists and pedestrians.

Cycling is a healthy life skill and provides fitness and environmental benefits to its participants. As well, it is a fun activity. I hope that you will use your position to promote bike friendly schools and to encourage cycling by our young people, during Bike Week and throughout the year."
