Subject: Tracking Deaths in the Homeless Population

Purpose:

This report will outline the current status of homeless death monitoring in the City of Toronto and recommend steps to improve the quality of available information. The proposed mortality data resource will support regular reporting on notable trends and issues.

Financial Implications and Impact Statement:

There are no financial implications arising from this report.

Recommendations:

It is recommended that:

- (1) the Medical Officer of Health report to the Board of Health on aggregate findings and identified trends in deaths in the homeless population on a biannual basis, beginning with 2007 data; and
- (2) the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

Background:

At its meeting of March 9, 2005 the Community Services Committee passed the following recommendation:

"that the Community Services Committee, in consultation with the Medical Officer of Health, request of staff, a report on issues related to tracking homeless deaths in the City of Toronto, including a review of the identification protocols used in the City of Vancouver and the City of Ottawa."

The Office of the Chief Coroner of Ontario, Shelter, Support & Housing Administration Division and the Toronto Disaster Relief Committee have been consulted in the preparation of this report.

Comments:

Issues Related to Deaths of Homeless People:

High rates of illness and premature death among the homeless population have been widely recognized, including in studies of Toronto's homeless population. Given the often isolated existence of people who are homeless, their deaths often go unrecognized. In certain instances, such individuals will not be identified, or may not have known next of kin. It often rests with the shelter system or community agencies, in collaboration with other authorities such as those in law enforcement, social services and health care, to attempt to ensure that clients receive a proper burial and that every effort is made to identify and notify next of kin. There is also community concern over what appears to be an escalating death rate and absence of comprehensive tracking in order to develop preventive measures such as transitional housing, harm reduction housing or palliative care.

Current Tracking of Deaths of Homeless People in Toronto:

The Office of the Chief Coroner ("the Coroner") generally investigates deaths that are of a sudden, suspicious nature, are accidental or unexpected, or are otherwise not natural. Such deaths will have been reported to the Coroner by law enforcement officials, health care practitioners and other community service providers, and subsequently investigated. Most natural deaths do not involve the Coroner; however, if an individual dies while living on the street, even if their death is deemed to be from natural causes, the Coroner will investigate.

The Toronto Indigent Deaths Enquiries (TIDE) Project was established in 1999 as a repository for information regarding deaths among homeless individuals defined as "any person who has no fixed address and dies in a public place (street or building), hostel, or in hospital having been admitted from any of the above". Between 1999 and 2005, it has recorded an average of 38 deaths per year, or 269 in total, based on information provided by the Office of the Chief Coroner for Toronto; however, despite the above definition, TIDE data will only include those deaths which have been reported to, and investigated by, the Coroner.

The Coroner has made efforts to ensure that all deaths meeting the above description are captured in TIDE data; however, there may be some deaths of homeless individuals which may not be included in the Coroner's data. For example, if a homeless person has been determined to be palliative and, thus, their death is expected, even if they die in a shelter or hospital, it may be deemed unnecessary for the Coroner to investigate.

The Coroner's office cannot publicly release any identifying information regarding a deceased person; they can, however, corroborate or confirm information, if a caller provides a name and/or physical description of the deceased. The primary way to initially identify a person is to provide any unique marks, tattoos or other physical description to Coroner's staff. In such cases, a

relevant agency/shelter worker may visit the morgue to identify an individual. If family members are available, the deceased's identity can be confirmed through DNA analysis. The Toronto Coroner's office states that there are fewer than ten unidentified bodies per year in their morgue; a collaborative effort to identify the homeless among them could make this number even smaller.

The Toronto Disaster Relief Committee (TDRC) is an organization that is involved in research, advocacy and public education on issues affecting homeless people in Toronto. In addition, TDRC is the national secretariat for the National Housing and Homelessness Network and is involved in the 1% campaign, a national campaign to reintroduce a national housing program. This group has also been recording deaths for their homeless memorial, which names over 400 homeless or formerly homeless people, who have died since the mid-1980s. TDRC uses a broader definition than TIDE for homeless deaths. TDRC's definition is "individuals who died while living on the street, staying in a shelter, in custody with no fixed address, in hospital or long-term care with no fixed address in the community, in transitory and short-term accommodations, living in unsafe and/or inadequate accommodation (i.e. squats, rooming houses) and Aboriginals on their home reserve if they went there with the knowledge they were ill".

TDRC gathers such information from frontline agencies, homeless individuals and, in some cases, the Coroner's office. In the years since TIDE data has been kept, 1999-2005, 300 individual deaths have been tracked, confirmed and documented by the TDRC, however a significant number remain listed as John or Jane Doe. The list of deaths maintained by the TDRC is attached (see Appendix 1).

Tracking Systems in other Jurisdictions:

(a) Ottawa

Homeless death data is collected through the Street Health Coalition Committee, a network of health providers, based on outreach workers' reports. Individuals are identified as homeless, living in shelters or users of shelter and/or drop-in services, along with any relevant demographic and health related information. This initiative has collected information on the deaths of over 240 such individuals in the City of Ottawa since 1998. No Coroner's data are available, since deceased are not identified as homeless in the Ottawa Coroner's data.

(b) Vancouver

Vancouver has an informal system of counting homeless deaths, which is administered by the Lookout Emergency Aid Society, an inner city social service agency. There is no official record being kept at this time.

Development of a Tracking System in Toronto:

Currently, no fully coordinated system exists through which deaths (in shelters, in hospitals, on the street, or elsewhere) of homeless individuals are communicated and relevant information collated.

City of Toronto Hostel Services, through its network of 65 directly operated and purchase of service shelters, is within its mandate to gather data on deaths occurring in shelters. In addition, data on clients who die in hospital or on the street, while resident in a shelter, may also be available from shelter operators. Hostel Services of the Shelter, Support and Housing Administration Division will work with the City of Toronto Corporate Access and Privacy to develop a database to gather data on the deaths of homeless individuals in hostels. Such information would contribute to an overall picture of the situation in the City.

Appendix 2 summarizes the roles of those agencies currently involved in monitoring and documenting deaths of homeless individuals, those who could potentially contribute further to the knowledge base, as well as the nature and quality of information from each.

A more complete picture will combine the information gathered by:

- (a) Hostel Services information regarding deaths of homeless clients resident in, or recently associated with, shelters.
- (b) TIDE project (Office of the Chief Coroner for Toronto, Toronto Public Health) data on deaths of homeless individuals in Toronto, which have been investigated by the Coroner's office.
- (c) Toronto Disaster Relief Committee (TDRC) information on deaths of homeless persons, which has been brought to their attention by individuals or community agencies.

Information from the provincial deaths registry (Office of the Registrar General) does not contain indicators of homelessness, and thus, would not be of any use to the database.

A more complete deaths database would help to monitor deaths among the homeless population. This information would help to identify trends and issues and to help identify solutions such as the special housing needs of people, as well as reduce the number of unidentified people through coordinated efforts of Hostel Services and homeless service providers, as well as Coroner, Law Enforcement, Health Care and Public Health officials.

Although there will be three sources of data, there will be limitations regarding sharing and cross-referencing of information. For example, TDRC is able to share this information with Hostel Services who will then be able to determine if there are duplicates. As well, Hostel Services will be able to determine if any of their deaths are also coroner deaths. Activity will take place within the established parameters of privacy laws.

Toronto Public Health is working with Shelter, Support & Housing Administration in establishing a more comprehensive record of deaths of homeless people in the City of Toronto. This requires developing policy and information management procedures by Hostel Services, in

collaboration with Corporate Access and Privacy, and collation of all death-related information (in anonymous, aggregate form) from all sources.

A biannual report to the Board of Health will identify key indicators from accumulated data and identify notable trends in deaths, such as causes, annual patterns, locations, etc. Recommendations may arise from these reports related to identified service gaps and funding needs. The first report will be produced based on data from the 2007 calendar year.

Toronto Public Health will continue to investigate best practices from other jurisdictions in monitoring deaths in homeless populations, and adjust monitoring in Toronto as appropriate.

Conclusions:

The significance of premature death in the homeless population, combined with the often isolated existence of this group, requires a unique approach involving collaborative efforts to assist in the identification both of deceased individuals and notable mortality trends. Furthermore, additional efforts to confirm identification will promote a dignified recognition of the individual's death, including supporting notification of next of kin.
