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BRIEFING NOTE

2006 Capital Budget – Environmental Initiatives

Issue/Background:

At the December 12, 2005 meeting of the Roundtable on the Environment, staff was requested to provide information on the environmental initiatives contained in the City of Toronto 2006 Capital Budget, including the following:

- (1) specific environmental initiatives contained in the 2006 City of Toronto Capital Budget and the details of their approval by City Council;
- (2) how the environmental initiatives relate to the overall goals of the City;
- (3) discussions of the initiatives in a larger context (e.g., why choices were made, and benefits to members of the public);
- (4) how the environmental initiatives address the recommendations contained in the report entitled "Environmental Plan: Clean, Green and Healthy A Plan for an Environmentally Sustainable Toronto; and
- (5) the level of engagement of members of the public in the decision-making process which determined which capital projects received approval.

Key Points:

- The attached spreadsheet contains budget information on environmental initiatives approved during the 2006 Capital Budget process. The information is listed by project category linked to a City Division.
- Capital budgets are submitted by City Divisions in accordance with City Council's approved guidelines, which include debt targets to ensure affordability. The primary objective of the City's overall capital budget is to ensure that existing infrastructure and capital assets are rehabilitated and maintained in a state of good repair. Environmental capital projects must be considered with all other divisional requests within the assigned debt targets.
- Public deputations concerning Capital Budget proposals were made at two points in the process at Standing Committee meetings and, later in the process, at a joint meeting of the Policy and Finance Committee and Budget Advisory Committee.
- The spreadsheet contains information on how each capital expenditure relates to the City of Toronto's Environmental Plan recommendations and the overall goals of the City including Divisional goals and priorities.
- Project specific public consultation activities are identified on the spreadsheet where applicable.

Conclusions:

In 2006, City Divisions have committed more that \$180 million to capital projects with direct environmental benefits.

The City's Executive Environment Team is currently developing a process that will result in a consolidated environmental budget (operating & capital) for consideration during the 2007 budget process and beyond.
