CITY OF TORONTO

BY-LAW 1021-2026

To amend City of Toronto Municipal Code Chapter 937, Temporary Closing of Highways and Chapter 950, Traffic and Parking, in respect of the 2026 Huron Street Pedestrianization.

The Council of the City of Toronto Council enacts:

1. City of Toronto Municipal Code Chapter 937, Temporary Closing of Highways, is amended as follows:

- A. Adding a new subsection §937-3.51 as follows:

§937-3.51. Closures for the purposes of the 2026 Huron Street Pedestrianization

Despite any other by-law, until October 31, 2026, the General Manager, Transportation Services of the City of Toronto may temporarily close to vehicular and pedestrian traffic any highway or portion of a highway for a period up to and including ninety (90) consecutive days, as required for the purposes of managing traffic movements prior to and during the 2026 Huron Street Pedestrianization.

2. City of Toronto Municipal Code Chapter 950, Traffic and Parking, is amended as follows:

- A. Adding a new subsection §950-410 as follows:

§950-410. Temporary Parking, Standing or Stopping Restrictions to Accommodate the 2026 Huron Street Pedestrianization

Despite any other by-law, where temporary signs approved by the General Manager have been posted to restrict parking as a result of the 2026 Huron Street Pedestrianization, no person shall park, stand or stop a vehicle on the side of the highway where the signs have been posted.

Enacted and passed on July 30, 2026.
