City's Critical Care Transfer Unit (CCTU) Funding Agreement with Ornge

City Council Decision

City Council on July 16, 17, 18 and 19, 2007, adopted the following motions:

- 1. City Council grant authority for the City of Toronto to enter into a funding agreement with Ornge for the provision of critical care transfer unit services in 2007 2008 such that transfer payments can begin.
- 2. The appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

(May 23, 2007) Report from Chief and General Manager, Toronto Emergency Medical Services

Committee Recommendations

The Community Development and Recreation Committee recommends that:

- 1. City Council grant authority for the City of Toronto to enter into a funding agreement with Ornge for the provision of critical care transfer unit services in 2007 2008 such that transfer payments can begin; and
- 2. the appropriate City officials be authorized and directed to take the necessary action to give effect thereto.

Financial Impact

There is no financial impact to the approved 2007 Operating budget for Toronto Emergency Medical Services. Financial transfer payments to the City of Toronto in the amount of \$2,855,495 will offset Toronto Emergency Medical Services operating costs for the provision of CCTU services for the fiscal period April 1, 2007 – March 31, 2008.

Summary

In prior years, the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care provided funding directly to the City of Toronto for CCTU services. For the fiscal year April 1, 2007 – March 31, 2008, the City of Toronto was informed that the Ministry intended to flow the funding through Ornge – formerly Ontario Air Ambulance Services Inc. Consequently, a funding agreement has been drafted with Ornge in the amount of \$2,855,495. Legal Services provided input and guidance throughout the process.

Based on staff review and consultation, Toronto Emergency Medical Services on behalf of the City of Toronto is seeking authority to sign the funding agreement with Ornge. CCTU funding will begin once the agreement is signed and shall be paid bi-monthly to an account so designated by the City.

Financial Impact

There is no financial impact for Toronto Fire Services.

Summary

The Heart and Stroke Foundation Canada is offering a one-time program to the Fire Services to facilitate a large CPR training event to develop the skills of the public. The primary focus of the project is to increase the number of people trained in basic CPR skills to assist victims. The DVD training video and mannequin provides an alternative training format to the traditional classroom setting and reaches individuals who do not normally attend classes. The training event will be held at a Toronto Blue Jays game on August 19, 2007.
