# Parking Ticket Activity - 2006

## SUMMARY

In 2006, the City of Toronto issued 2,852,100 parking infraction notices (i.e. parking tickets). This report provides statistical data on parking ticket issuance, trial requests, trial activity, and collection rates.

#### **Financial Impact**

There are no financial implications associated with this report.

The Deputy City Manager and Chief Financial Officer has reviewed this report and agrees with the financial impact information.

## **DECISION HISTORY**

At its Special Meeting held on February 24, 25, 26, 27 and 28, 2003 and March 3, 2003, City Council requested that the Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer report on the number and breakdown of all parking infraction notices issued in the City of Toronto (Clause No. 2 of Report No. 2 of The Policy and Finance Committee, headed "City of Toronto 2003 Recommended Operating Budget").

## **ISSUE BACKGROUND**

The City of Toronto issues approximately 2.8 million tickets each year. The Toronto Police Service, through its Parking Enforcement Unit, is responsible for parking enforcement and can provide information on enforcement practices. The Revenue Services Division is responsible for the processing and collection of fines for all parking infraction notices issued in the City of Toronto. The City collects fines on approximately 82 percent of tickets issued, representing annual revenues of approximately \$80 million.

## COMMENTS

In 2006, the City of Toronto issued 2,852,100 parking tickets. Approximately 2.6 million tickets were issued by the Toronto Police Services (i.e. Parking Enforcement Unit and Police Officers) and the balance of the tickets were issued by licensed Municipal Law Enforcement Officers (MLEOs – i.e. private security officers, property owners, etc.). MLEO's are trained and certified by the Toronto Police Service, and MLEO agencies are required to obtain a license from the City's Municipal Licensing and Standards Division in order to conduct parking enforcement on private property.

Table 1, below, provides a breakdown of the number of tickets issued in 2006 (with a comparison to 2005) by type of issuing officer/unit.

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As noted in Table 1 above, overall the number of parking tickets issued in 2006 is slightly lower than in 2005 - there were 6,253 fewer parking tickets issued in 2006. There are many variables that may impact parking ticket issuance in any given year. The reduction could be due in part to the implementation (in the Fall of 2006) of the handheld parking ticket writers which reduced issuance levels during the initial roll-out and training period. The Toronto Police Service, Parking Enforcement Unit also advises that there has been a higher level of compliance by motorists with respect to parking legally since 2005, most likely attributable to the Voluntary Payment amount being eliminated in November 2004. In addition, general economic information indicates that the high fuel prices in 2006 may have resulted in fewer vehicles on the City's streets.

#### Breakdown of 2006 Parking Offences (Appendix A)

Appendix A, attached, provides a breakdown (by type of parking offence) of the number of parking infraction notices issued in 2006, in order of ticket issuance (i.e. highest number of tickets issued to lowest).

In 2006, the largest number of tickets were issued with respect to "Expired Meter" offences (i.e. offences related to failing to deposit the fee in parking meters or Pay and Display machines) and "No Parking" offences (i.e. offences related to prohibited parking areas such as major arterial roadways and transit routes). These two categories represented approximately 45% of the parking tickets issued in 2006. The next highest category of offences was "No Valid Permit" (i.e. offences where vehicles are ticketed for failing to display a valid residential parking permit) which represented approximately 18% of all tickets issued in 2006.

#### Collection Rate Activity for Tickets Issued in 2006 & Prior Years (Appendix B)

Appendix B, attached, provides information on the tickets issued each year since 1989, and the number of tickets that have been paid as at December 31, 2006. Based on prior years' experience, staff has also projected what the final collection rate is expected to be for each of the years.

As noted in Appendix B, the collection rate for tickets issued in 2006 and paid as at December 31, 2006, was approximately 56%. However, given that offenders will continue to pay parking tickets issued in 2006, in 2007 and later years (when renewing their license plates at the Ministry of Transportation), the collection rate is expected to increase to approximately 82%.

The City continues to collect upon parking tickets issued in prior years. In 2006, payments were received for current year (2006) tickets as well as tickets issued between 1989 and 2005. For example, 577 parking tickets issued in 1989 (representing \$17,075 in fines) were paid in 2006. Although staff are unable to determine exactly why these payments are being received for tickets that were issued as far back as seventeen (17) years ago, it is believed that some of these payments are generated when drivers reactivate a dormant license plate or decide to clear their fines at the Ministry of Transportation offices.

#### Summary of Trial Requests and Court Conviction Activity - 2006 (Appendix C)

Appendix C, attached, provides a breakdown of trial requests and court conviction activity for tickets issued in 2006 and other years, where court activity was required or requested by the offender. In 2006, 110,775 (or approximately 3.9%) of parking ticket recipients requested a trial. However, only 31,843 of these 110,775 tickets actually went to trial, given that some offenders opted to pay their tickets after filing a trial request and before the trial. Of the 31,843 tickets that went to trial, 25,125 (or 85.95%) received a conviction by the Justice of the Peace.

#### Summary of Cancellations and Withdrawals – 2006

Although the City of Toronto's collection rate is one of the highest in Canada, approximately 18% of all parking tickets are not collected upon for a variety of reasons. In 2006, of the approximately 2.8 million tickets issued, 502,963 or 17.63% of these were cancelled. Table 2, below, outlines the various reasons why these tickets were cancelled.

\*Cancelled/Conviction by the Judiciary - may result in a conviction being registered; however, a suspended sentence may be imposed whereby the offender is not required to pay the fine and the tag is treated as cancelled since no revenue is forthcoming.

Overall, the cancellations in 2006 were very similar to the number of tickets cancelled in 2005. There was a substantial increase in the number of tickets cancelled due to "plate errors" which may be attributable to the Ministry of Transportation updating its licence plate database. However, decreases in other categories more than offset this increase. Overall, the number of parking tickets cancelled in 2006 decreased by 2,379 as compared to 2005.

\*\* Total on Docket refers to those offenders who followed through with their trial request. The difference between the number of trial requests and Total on Docket is due to some offenders opting to pay their tickets after filing a trial request and negating the need for a trial.

\*\*\* Total Convicted refers to those offenders who received a conviction by the Justice of the Peace, however, a conviction does not necessarily mean that the offender is required to pay the fine since a significant number of convictions result in suspended sentences whereby the offender is not required to pay the fine.
