607 Briar Hill Ave – Removal of One Private Tree

SUMMARY

The report requests Council's authority to deny the request for removal of one (1) privately owned 87.5 centimetre diameter black walnut tree (*Juglans nigra*) located at the rear of 607 Briar Hill Avenue. The application has been made due to concerns expressed by the property owner that the falling walnuts are a hazard to the children.

The tree is a healthy and viable specimen. With proper care and maintenance, the tree should continue to provide benefits to the community for years to come. All trees have some level of maintenance associated with their placement in the landscape. The increased maintenance associated with the fruit from black walnut trees does not justify their removal.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The General Manager of Parks, Forestry and Recreation recommends that Council deny the request for a permit to remove one (1) privately owned tree at 607 Briar Hill Avenue.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

There are no financial implications resulting from the adoption of this report.

ISSUE BACKGROUND

In accordance with *City of Toronto Municipal Code, Chapter 813, Trees, Article III*, an application has been made for a permit to remove one (1) privately owned tree located at the rear of the property municipally known as 607 Briar Hill Avenue. This application

has been made due to concerns expressed by the property owners that the fruit from the tree is a hazard.

COMMENTS

An application for permit has been received from Shady Lane Expert Tree Care on behalf of the property owners of 607 Briar Hill Avenue for the removal of one (1) privately owned 87.5-centimetre diameter black walnut tree (*Juglans nigra*) located at the rear of the property.

This application has been made due to concerns expressed by the property owner that the falling fruit from the tree is a hazard.

The Arborist Report that was submitted with the application for a permit to remove the subject tree indicates that the tree is in good condition. After visiting the site and reviewing the information provided by the applicant, Urban Forestry staff feel that the tree is healthy and can be maintained in good condition. The tree has a well-developed crown with few defects.

Walnut trees are considered a nuisance by some people due to the nuts. Urban Forestry Services staff are of the opinion that all trees have an element of maintenance associated with their placement in a landscape setting and removal of the tree due to an increased maintenance requirement is not justifiable.

As required under *Section 813-17, of City of Toronto Municipal Code, Chapter 813, Trees, Article III*, a 'Notice' of application sign was posted on the subject property for the minimum 14 day posting period. The posting serves to notify the community of the application and provide an opportunity for objection. One letter of objection, signed by residents of three neighbouring properties, was received in response to the posting.

This tree is very significant and is a valuable part of the forest community that exists within this area. Black walnuts are large-growing, long-lived, strong-wooded trees. Established and healthy black walnut trees have the ability to grow to be 170 centimetres in diameter and live to be 250 years old. With proper care and maintenance, the subject tree should continue to provide benefits to the owner and to the community for many years to come. Urban Forestry cannot support removal of this tree.
