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### Appointment of Area Weed Inspectors 2007

(March 21, 2007) report from the General Manager, Parks, Forestry and Recreation.

### Recommendations

The General Manager of Parks, Forestry and Recreation Division recommends that:

1. City Council authorize the amendment of By-law No. 383-2004, to appoint area weed inspectors under the *Weed Control Act* and to repeal By-law No. 308-1998, "A By-law to appoint Weed Inspectors," to appoint David Chapman and Nancy Lowes as area weed inspectors and to revoke the appointments of Russell Warkman and Nancy Yarwood;

2. the City Clerk provide written notice to the Chief Weed Inspector as required under the *Weed Control Act*;
3. City Council authorize the amendment of Municipal Code Chapter 169, Officials, and City, to provide that:
  - a. the General Manager of Parks, Forestry and Recreation is responsible for monitoring the need for changes to the City's area weed inspector appointments made by the by-law under the *Weed Control Act*; and
  - b. the General Manager may request the City Solicitor to submit the necessary bill directly to Council when the General Manager identifies the need to:
    - i. under the *Weed Control Act*;
    - ii. repeal the appointment of an area weed inspector as a result of changes in employment or duties; or
    - iii. to make technical amendments to current appointments (for example, to reflect a name change).

### **Financial Impact**

There are no financial implications resulting from the adoption of this report.

### **Summary**

The City is required to appoint one or more area weed inspectors by by-law, under subsection 6(1) of the *Weed Control Act*.

The purpose of the report is to amend By-law No. 383-2004 with respect to changes in appointments of area weed inspectors and identify the new area weed inspectors.

The report also recommends that Municipal Code Chapter 169, Officials, City, be amended to make the General Manager of Parks, Forestry and Recreation responsible for monitoring changes to the area weed inspectors' appointments. When the General Manager determines there is a need for a change, the General Manager is authorized to request the City Solicitor to submit the necessary bill directly to Council.

### **Committee Recommendations**

On motion by Councillor Walker, the Parks and Environment Committee recommended that:

1. City Council authorize the amendment of By-law No. 383-2004, to appoint area weed inspectors under the *Weed Control Act* and to repeal By-law No. 308-1998, "A By-law to appoint Weed Inspectors," to appoint David Chapman and Nancy Lowes as area weed inspectors and to revoke the appointments of Russell Warkman and Nancy Yarwood;

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### Waste Audit of City Parks

(March 9, 2007) report from the General Manager, Parks, Forestry and Recreation.

### Recommendations

1. Parks, Forestry and Recreation staff continue to work with Solid Waste Management Services to improve and expand waste diversion initiatives in City parks; and
2. Parks, Forestry and Recreation staff collaborate with Solid Waste Management Services to educate the public and increase awareness of the need for waste diversion.

### Financial Impact

There are no financial implications resulting from the adoption of this report.

### Summary

As part of its three-year Waste Diversion Plan, approved in 2004, Parks, Forestry and Recreation recently conducted a Parks Waste Audit (Attachment 1). Staff examined almost three metric tonnes of waste from 585 litter and 157 recycling baskets at 126 parks – sorting, weighing and recording material using 14 separate categories (i.e., glass, paper, plastic, pet waste). A summary of findings and recommendations can be found on pages 49 to 51 of the Parks Waste Audit Report.

Subsequent to its 2004-2006 plan, the Parks, Forestry and Recreation Division submitted a four-year Waste Diversion Plan in January 2007 which sets out initiatives selected to improve future diversion rates. This year's program will continue twinning litter baskets with labelled recycling baskets to improve the diversion rate of recyclable materials from the litter stream as well as educational and outreach activities to address the large amount of recyclables and pet waste entering the Parks' litter stream.

The Parks, Forestry and Recreation Division will continue with its effort to meet future diversion targets and explore innovative methods to reduce parks' waste.

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### **2 for 1 Toronto Island Ferry Pricing for Adult Tickets, May 22-September 2, 2007 - 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.**

(March 15, 2007) report from the General Manager, Parks Forestry and Recreation.

### **Recommendations**

The General Manger of Parks, Forestry and Recreation recommends that:

1. a 2007 pilot pricing project wherein 2 for 1 pricing on adult fares be approved and implemented for the period from May 22 through to September 2 and the hours of 5:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m.; and

2. the following restrictions be implemented at the same time:
  - a. all holiday weekends and special events would be exempt from the 2 for 1 pricing and would be full price;
  - b. two tickets must be sold at one time and there will be no half-price tickets sold to one individual; and
  - c. the 2 for 1 offer would not operate in conjunction with any other promotion.

### **Financial Impact**

There are no financial implications resulting from the adoption of this report.

### **Summary**

The 2 for 1 ferry pricing is an attempt to attract adult customers to the Toronto Islands during off peak hours. Approximately 75% of our passengers leave the island at about 5:00 p.m. It is our intent to entice them to stay longer and increase their participation at island amenities. The special pricing will require City Council authority to change existing ticket prices.

This pilot project will operate within existing staffing resources and budget allotment. This should assist in earning additional revenue for the Toronto Islands' operation through the return on food and beverage sales as well as additional ferry ticket sales.

### **Committee Recommendations**

On motion by Councillor Moeser, the Parks and Environment Committee recommended to City Council that:

1. a 2007 pilot pricing project wherein 2 for 1 pricing on adult fares be approved and implemented for the period from May 22 through to September 2 and the hours of 5:00 p.m.-9:00 p.m.; and
2. the following restrictions be implemented at the same time:
  - a. all holiday weekends and special events would be exempt from the 2 for 1 pricing and would be full price;
  - b. two tickets must be sold at one time and there will be no half-price tickets sold to one individual; and
  - c. the 2 for 1 offer would not operate in conjunction with any other promotion.

### **Decision Advice and Other Information**

On motion by Councillor McConnell, the Parks and Environment Committee requested the General Manager, Parks, Forestry and Recreation, in consultation with the General Manager, Economic Development, Culture and Tourism, and Tourism Toronto, to report to the September 14, 2007 meeting of the Parks and Environment Committee on marketing the City's destination parks.

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### Providing Shade at Parks, Forestry and Recreation Sites

(March 15, 2007) report from the General Manager, Parks, Forestry and Recreation.

#### Summary

The purpose of this report is to provide information on efforts being made by the Parks, Forestry and Recreation Division to address shade at Parks, Forestry and Recreation sites and to provide information regarding the assessment of shade at city playgrounds. The Division has policy guidelines in place to assist with improving opportunities for both natural shade (trees) and constructed shade (shelters) wherever feasible. Consideration of shade is a component of the design process for new and retrofitted facilities and park sites.

With 833 playgrounds under the management of Parks, Forestry and Recreation, an examination of City playgrounds to determine which have sufficient shade and those that are deficient, is a large undertaking. Staff are developing an approach to this review and will report back, this fall, to the Parks and Environment Committee on the implications (both financial and operational) of undertaking this work.
