## 2008 AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Allocation Recommendations

## SUMMARY

This report outlines the review process, funding applications and recommendations of the Board of Health AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Review Panel regarding allocations in 2008.

This report proposes funding allocations in the total amount of \$1,613,800.00 for the 2009 AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program within the Community Partnership and Investment Program (CPIP) to be used between July 1, 2008 and June 30, 2009.

The sum of \$1,513,800.00 will be provided to 47 project applicants to carryout targeted HIV/AIDS prevention education programs in Toronto. In addition, \$100,000.00 be provided to Schools Without Borders (SWB) for the AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Global HIV/AIDS Initiative.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

# The 2008 AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Review Panel recommends that:

1. the Board of Health recommend that Toronto City Council approve the allocation of \$1,513,800.00 to 47 projects as recommended by the 2008 AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Review Panel in Appendix B and Appendix C of this report;

- 2. the Board of Health recommend that Toronto City Council approve an allocation of \$100,000 to Schools Without Borders to enhance Toronto's response to HIV/AIDS globally and as a legacy to the XVI International AIDS Conference held in Toronto in August 2006, as recommended by the AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Review Panel in Appendix D of this report;
- 3. the Board of Health recommend the project allocations funding for the 2009 AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program be increased by \$486,200.00 (from \$1,513,800.00 to \$2,000,000.00), and that this recommendation will be forwarded to Budget Committee for its consideration during the 2009 Operating Budget process; and
- 4. authority be granted to the Medical Officer of Health to execute Letters of Understanding on behalf of the City.

#### **Financial Impact**

This report recommends that the 2008 approved Operating Budget of \$1,613,800.00 for the AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program within CPIP be allocated to the projects detailed in Appendix B and C (\$1,513,800.00) and Schools Without Borders (\$100,000.00).

The recommendation to increase the 2009 AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program from \$1,513,800.00 to \$2,000,000.00 will be forwarded to Budget Committee for its consideration during the 2009 Operating Budget process and thus, this report has no financial impact beyond what has been approved in the 2008 Approved Operating Budget.

The Deputy City Manager and Chief Financial Officer has reviewed this report and agrees with the financial impact information.

## **DECISION HISTORY**

At its meeting January 21, 2008 the Board of Health appointed ten members and two alternates to serve on the 2008 AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Review Panel (Appendix A). As in previous years, the Review Panel assesses funding applications in relation to program objectives and priorities, and recommends final allocations through the Board of Health to City Council. All Review Panel members are asked to declare any conflict of interest prior to each review session and are not present during the review of the applications when there is a conflict.

The Review Panel met May 15, 2008, to make preliminary funding recommendations for 64 project applications. These recommendations were then forwarded to applicants, with

information on how to appeal the proposed services and allocation. A total of \$23,437 was reserved for the Appeals process.

Deputations pertaining to seven of applications were heard on May 29, 2008, at the AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Appeals Hearing. Following the Appeals process, the AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program made its final service and allocation recommendations.

Appendix B details services required of projects recommended for funding. Appendix C provides a list of funding applicants, recommended awards and payment schedule.

The 2008 AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Review Panel, at it's meeting of the Appeals, May 29, 2008, recommended an allocation of \$100,000.00 to Schools Without Borders to implement the Safe Spaces project for girls Swaziland and to strengthen the existing Safe Spaces projects for girls in South East District Youth Empowerment League (SEDYEL, Botswana) and Mathare Youth Sports Association (MYSA, Kenya).

Schools Without Borders (SWB) is a Toronto based community agency that has worked in AIDS prevention globally. Appendix D details the services required and related budget allocation.

## **ISSUE BACKGROUND**

The AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program was established by the former Toronto City Council in 1987 to support community initiatives in providing targeted HIV/AIDS prevention education programs.

Toronto City Council established the Global AIDS Initiative in 2007 as a tangible legacy of the XVI International AIDS Conference and to establish information exchange and skills transfer with international partners who are disproportionately at risk for HIV/AIDS.

## COMMENTS

## **Community Outreach**

Potential applicants were made aware of the AIDS Prevention funding through publicly promoted information sessions and proposal writing workshops held in several locations in the fall. The application was also available on the City of Toronto website.

## **Annual Review Process**

AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program staff reviewed applications in relation to established eligibility criteria and funding priorities, following policies and procedures

resulting from recommendations of the 2001 Grants Business Improvement Process and the 2001 Auditors Report which were received by the Board of Health in November, 2002. All applicants must submit a recent audited financial statement to assess the reasonableness of their unrestricted reserves.

Applications were also reviewed to ensure that proposed activities fell within the priorities of the AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program. These priorities take into consideration current HIV/AIDS and STI epidemiologic data and include emerging trends, (e.g. higher HIV/AIDS prevalence among people from endemic countries), underserved and high-risk populations (e.g. men who have sex with men (MSM), injection drug users, youth and women) and collaborative projects or partnerships with other agencies.

Further consideration was given to projects targeting high-need geographic areas and city-wide initiatives. Emphasis was placed on reducing duplication of services being undertaken by other community agencies and/or Toronto Public Health. Project reports and evaluations of currently funded projects were taken into consideration when a new project application from the same organization was reviewed. Projects were not recommended for funding if the organization did not have reasonable unrestricted reserves or failed to adequately meet the identified priorities.

Recommended funding allocations are based on a number of factors including the reasonableness of hourly and salaried staff wages with respect to proposed activities and other budgeted line items. Budget item requests must be consistent with the activities and objectives described in the proposal. A project expense guide is included with the application package to assist applicants.

The Review Panel examined and considered advice from staff, heard appeals, and has made allocations recommendations to the Board of Health. This year, the panel had difficulty meeting the funding needs of its priority populations (priorities based on epidemiological data, priority neighbourhoods, vulnerable populations related to social determinants). In addition the Public Health Agency of Canada has identified Positive Prevention (prevention strategies for people who are HIV positive) and aboriginal peoples as priorities. An increase in budget of two million dollars would be required to meet these service needs.

## Summary of Applications and Recommendations

This year, the Review Panel received 64 AIDS prevention project applications by the deadline. Forty-four projects were from the South Region, five from the East Region, ten from the West Region and five from the North Region. Approximately 35 applicants proposed City-wide services. The total amount requested from project applicants for the 2008 funding period is \$2,535,858.00. The total assessed need is \$1,859,577.00.

The Community Review Panel proposes allocations for 47 projects for a total of \$1,513,800.00. Of the projects recommended for funding, 34 are from the South Region;

4 from the North Region, 3 from the East and 6 from the West Region. Twenty-six projects will provide services citywide.

## **Toronto Global AIDS Initiative**

Toronto City Council approved an annual amount of \$100,000.00 to the AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program (APCIP) budget in 2007, for Global AIDS Prevention Initiatives. The Global AIDS Prevention Initiative is promoted through a focused call for project proposals.

Global AIDS Prevention Initiative applications are reviewed by staff to ensure they meet established criteria that include:

- demonstrates undertaking youth engagement initiatives;
- having a track record of involvement in HIV/AIDS globally and/or in international development with an interest in HIV/AIDS;
- capacity to leverage additional sources of funding;
- key stakeholders and the intended international target population are identified as partners and collaborators in the implementation of the project; and
- epidemiologic need is demonstrated.

The AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program will continue to implement the established risk management framework or the review of applicants and monitoring of Global AIDS Prevention projects.

#### Appendix A AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Review Panel Terms of Reference

#### Purpose:

Toronto Public Health has used Review Panels for more than ten years to bring citizen expertise and participation to the allocation of funds for AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program (APCIP). The Review Panel works with staff to review each application and make recommendations to the Board of Health.

The Review Panel includes City Council members, Board of Health members, informed citizens, and people living with HIV and AIDS. In addition, the Medical Officer of Health has endeavored to ensure representation from across the City.

Appointments to the Review Panel is made by the Board of Health following a public call for potential members, consultations with City Councillors and others to ensure representation from equity seeking groups, as well as representation from diverse neighbourhoods around the City. The Medical Officer of Health shall ensure the AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Review Panel receives the AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program staff report for information to assist in the review process.

Membership:

- (a) Up to three (3) members of City Council;
- (b) A minimum of one (1) member of the Board of Health;
- (c) At least two (2) persons living with HIV, who are residents of the City of Toronto;
- (d) A minimum of four (4) persons from among diverse ethno-racial communities, who are residents of the City of Toronto;

Membership will be representative of the diverse neighbourhoods from across the City. The review panel will elect a chair and a vice chair at its first meeting.

#### Quorum:

A quorum for decision making will be 50% of the review panel membership.

Role of the AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Review Panel:

That the role of the APCIP Panel is as follows:

- (a) Review and evaluate project proposal submissions.
- (b) Make allocation recommendations to the BOH with the assistance of Public Health Staff.

- (c) Submit recommendations for AIDS Prevention funding allocations to the BOH, for approval by City Council.
- (d) Attend program training and information session(s).
- (e) Attend all program application review meetings as required.
- (f) Attend all program application appeal hearings as required.
- (g) Declare all potential and real Conflict of Interest, i.e. membership, employment and other affiliations with program applicants.

Term of Service for the AIDS Prevention Community Program Investment Review Panel:

One year.

## Time commitment for the AIDS Prevention Community Investment Program Review Panel:

Minimum of 5 to 7 days per year, including training, review/assessment of applications, hearing of appeals and/or debriefing and community consultation. This includes a minimum of 8 - 10 hours of independent review of applications.

Organization: 2-SPIRITED PEOPLE OF THE 1ST NATIONS Project Title: 2 Spirits HIV/AIDS Outreach Prevention, 2008A-18C Recommended for funding of \$9,688

To employ a 7 hour/week HIV/AIDS Outreach Prevention Project Coordinator to:

- Coordinate and provide 2 HIV/AIDS prevention workshops per month to Aboriginal women, men, youth and Two Spirit people located in York West, York South-Weston, St. Paul's, Toronto Centre Rosedale, Toronto-Danforth and Scarborough East;
- Provide 12 HIV/AIDS prevention workshops targeted to Aboriginal women, men, youth, Two-Spirit people and Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal service providers citywide; and,
- Work with an advisory committee consisting of service providers and elders to determine additional needs of the Aboriginal community related to HIV/AIDS.

Organization: 519 CHURCH STREET COMMUNITY CENTRE (THE) Project Title: Trans Sex worker Outreach Project, 2008A-19C Recommended for funding of \$34,683

To employ a 20 hours/week HIV/AIDS Trans Outreach Worker to:

- Recruit and train 2 peer workers for a total of 8 hours/week each (16 peer hours/week total) for outreach and education;
- Outreach to trans sex workers distributing HIV prevention material (including "The Happy Transexual Hooker" safer sex manual), discussing sexual health issues and encouraging trans sex workers to attend the Monday night drop-in and informing them about the weekly "trans library";
- Conduct telephone outreach to indoor sex workers;
- Conduct 2 HIV prevention workshops at the Monday night Meal-Trans drop-in;
- Conduct 4 TS/TG trainings for service providers in Toronto;
- Distribute the "Trans 101 for Service Providers" manual to service providers; and,
- Coordinate and network with other sex-worker, trans and HIV/AIDS prevention and support agencies.

To employ a 35 hours/week HIV/AIDS Outreach Education and Information Coordinator to:

- Recruit, train and support 20 new volunteers to assist with project activities;
- Provide 16 HIV/AIDS prevention education workshops targeting African men, women, and youth, at organizations providing services to the diverse African communities;
- Conduct 8 HIV/AIDS sensitization sessions to religious leaders to promote HIV awareness and HIV antibody testing;
- Conduct a minimum of 70 HIV/AIDS outreach sessions to include settlement agencies, and diverse African social venues including barbershops, hair saloons, restaurants and bars;
- Publish 3 articles in African print media and speak on18 radio sessions to promote HIV/STI testing and HIV/AIDS resources and prevention information;
- Reprint and distribute 9000 HIV/AIDS awareness pamphlets;1500 each in 4 diverse African languages, including English and French; and,
- Continue to work collaboratively with Black CAP, Ethiopian Association, and Passerelle Integration et Developpement Economiques to build community capacity and to reduce duplication of services.

To employ a 15 hours/week MSM Outreach Co-ordinator and a 20 hours/week Tamil Outreach Co-ordinator to:

- Provide a minimum of 60 outreach sessions to South Asian MSM and a mimum of 20 outreach sessions to Tamil MSM at bathhouses, bars and other venues;
- Facilitate at least 12 sessions of Desi peer support for South Asian MSM and Sri Lankan peer support for Tamil-speaking men;
- Provide at least 6 workshops/special events about MSM issues to service providers;
- Provide 8 media appearances (articles, TV and radio shows), 3-4 in Tamil and reprint 5,000 HIV/AIDS prevention brochures targeting South Asian MSM;
- Maintain a project advisory committee consisting of staff, volunteers and community members, and;
- Continue to work in collaboration with the M2Men Network and Toronto Public Health GMHC, to identify topics based on review of current HIV/AIDS research and to engage men in bathhouses on the identified topics and report findings to the GMHC.

- Provide 10 HIV/AIDS workshops specific to South Asian women; and,

- Conduct 10 media appearances (radio, television, internet, and print) to provide HIV/AIDS prevention information to the South Asian community at least 4 directed to the Tamil community;
- Conduct 3 focus groups one each with youth, newcomers, and the Tamil community to assess project activities;
- Draft a youth-focused community education resource on HIV prevention/sexual health promotion/safer sex practice, and consult with TPH during the development of this resource, and,
- Provide a full day HIV/AIDS prevention community forum for South Asian communities targeting high-risk youth, service providers, and local politicians during South Asian Heritage Month.

To employ a 35 hours/week Education/Outreach Coordinator to:

• Recruit, train and support 8-10 new volunteer peer educators to assist with weekly outreach activities, including 2 to be trained as bathhouse Sexperts with a specific focus on HIV initiatives in bathhouses;

- Provide weekly prevention education sessions to bathhouses and monthly outreach to bars and community events in the downtown core and in the Scarborough Village to promote HIV/STI testing;
- Conduct 10 HIV/AIDS/STI prevention workshops/training sessions in collaboration with the ACAS Youth and Women's projects and the PHA Support Program; 1 targeting heterosexual males; 1 specific to ESL students; and 4 targeting East and Southeast Asian bathhouse patrons;
- Promote HIV/STI testing in collaboration with Hassle Free Clinic in 5 East and Southeast Asian print media targeting Asian MSM and on the ACAS MSM website in collaboration with TPH;
- Revise, translate and reprint 2,000 HIV/AIDS testing condom inserts to promote the project and HIV/AIDS testing;
- Conduct an Asian community HIV/AIDS forum in collaboration with the ACAS Women and Youth projects during World AIDS Day to increase awareness of HIV/AIDS issues affecting Asian MSM; and,
- Continue to work in collaboration with the Men2Men Network and Toronto Public Health GMHC, to identify topics based on review of current HIV/AIDS/STI research and to engage men in bathhouses on the identified topics and report findings to the GMHC.

To employ a 14 hours/week Women's Outreach and Education Coordinator to:

- Provide 24 HIV/AIDS and sexual health workshops to Asian women-at-risk citywide to include Steeles/L'Amoreaux, Jane/Finch and Lawrence Heights communities;
- Provide 14 HIV/AIDS outreach sessions at various East and Southeast Asian ethno-cultural community events, ESL classes, church groups, women's organizations, settlement houses, and other social venues throughout the city including Steeles/L'Amoreaux, Jane/Finch and Lawrence Heights communities;
- Reprint 2000 copies of the Women's HIV/AIDS antibody testing resource in English and translate into Japanese and print 2000 copies to be distributed citywide;
- Implement a community forum and press conference targeting at-risk East and Southeast Asian women during AIDS Awareness Week; and,
- Collaborate with ACAS Youth and MSM projects to organize outreach and workshops targeting East and Southeast Asian heterosexual men and to work in collaboration with East York East Toronto Family Resources to enhance community capacity.

To employ a 35 hours/week Youth Outreach and Education Coordinator to:

- Recruit, train and support 12 new Asian youth peer volunteers to assist with project activities;
- Provide 24 HIV/STI prevention education outreach activities, in collaboration with the ACAS Women's project, at a variety of venues city-wide, including the Malvern, Steeles/L'Amoreaux, and Jane-Finch neighbourhoods to reach Asian youth-at-risk;
- Conduct 25 HIV/AIDS workshops city-wide at high schools, colleges, universities and community centres, including identified priority neighbourhoods;
- Provide 10 HIV/AIDS events, 6 for Queer Asian youth and 4 for Asian Youth city-wide;
- Reprint and distribute 2000 linguistically appropriate HIV testing brochures targeting Asian youth;
- Provide a minimum of 4 articles in Asian print media to raise awareness of HIV/AIDS issues and HIV/STI testing for Asian youth, in collaboration with Toronto Public Health; and,
- Continue to collaborate with community partners including Jane-Finch Street Involved Youth Issues Coalition, Malvern Family Services and Agincourt Family Services to review HIV/STI trends of Asian Youth.

Organization: BLACK COALITION FOR AIDS PREVENTION Project Title: Gay, Bi and MSM Outreach, 2008A-6M Recommended for funding of \$46,042

To employ a 35 hours/week Men's Outreach Coordinator to:

- Recruit, train and support 20 active volunteers to assist with bathhouse and bar outreach activities;
- Conduct 78 HIV/STI bathhouse outreach sessions reaching 1,560 gay and bisexual Black men;
- Coordinate 24 HIV/STI outreach sessions reaching up to 480 gay and bisexual Black men at gay identified venues and events where Black gay and bisexual men socialize;
- Initiate 5 investigative outreach sessions at adult cinemas frequented by Black MSM;
- In collaboration with Public Health, provide 2 to 4 HIV/STI prevention messages in 2 Caribbean community print media targeting Black MSM; and,
- Continue to work in collaboration with the Men2Men Network and Toronto Public Health GMHC, to identify topics based on review of current HIV/STI research and to engage men in bathhouses on the identified topics and report findings to the GMHC.

#### Organization: BLACK COALITION FOR AIDS PREVENTION Project Title: AIDS Prevention, 2008A-24C Recommended for funding of \$58,418

To employ a 35 hour/week HIV/AIDS Outreach Co-ordinator to:

- Recruit and train an HIV/AIDS Peer Educator for 16 hours per week to provide outreach targeting youth, 15 to 24 years of age, at 20 youth focused events initiating HIV/AIDS and sexual health discussions, with 60% of all activities to be delivered in the west and east regions, particularly the Kingston/Galloway, Malvern, Weston/Mt. Denis and Jane/Finch neighbourhoods;
- Recruit, train and support 20 new outreach volunteers to assist with project activities and provide barbershops and beauty salons with HIV/AIDS resources;
- Provide 20 HIV/AIDS/STI workshops, targeting women, men, and youth; with 60% to be delivered in under-serviced and identified priority neighbourhoods;
- Conduct 52 HIV/AIDS outreach sessions at social venues and events in the Black community. Events include World AIDS Day, Black History Month, Afro Fest, Air Jamaica Day, Scarborough Pride, Toronto Gay Pride, and expanded Caribana outreach activities;
- Host 20 HIV/AIDS prevention education programs on CHRY radio to increase awareness of HIV/AIDS issues for the Black community in Toronto;
- Coordinate and facilitate 8 network sessions for APCIP funded projects and community groups to coordinate HIV/AIDS prevention services in the African/Caribbean communities; and,
- Design and print a resource for newly diagnosed women.

Organization: CENTRAL TORONTO COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTRE Project Title: Queen West CHC Harm Reduction Street Outreach Project, 2008A-11 Recommended for funding of \$60,414

To employ a 35 hour/week HIV/AIDS Outreach Educator to:

- Recruit, train and support a minimum of 6 Peer Outreach Workers (for a total of 30 peer hours/week) to do street outreach 3 days a week for 5 hours each day;
- Provide a minimum of 5 hours of street and shelter outreach a week;
- Provide a minimum of 2 hours a week on-site client support;
- Develop and facilitate 15 workshops on HIV prevention and harm reduction for Toronto agencies and services;
- Provide 4 2-hour shifts of staffing information tables with safer sex and harm reduction messaging; and,
- Coordinate and collaborate with relevant agencies and community partners.

Organization: CENTRAL TORONTO COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTRES Project Title: TRIP! Project, 2008A-38Y Recommended for funding of \$13,784

To employ a 2 hours/week Project Coordinator to:

- Recruit, train and support 3 Peer Outreach Workers for 6 hours/week each (18 peer hours/week total) to provide weekly outreach to the dance community at a variety of music events distributing HIV prevention supplies and information; and,
- Liaise with relevant community partners and monitor trends.

#### **Appendix D**

#### **Recommended Services and Allocations for the Global AIDS Prevention Initiative**

That City of Toronto Global AIDS Prevention Initiative Funding in the amount of \$100,000 be provided to Schools Without Borders to carry out the activities outlined below:

Schools Without Borders (SWB) Proposal for APCIP 2008-2009 Funding

#### 1. SWB Mandate

SWB is an authentically youth-led organization that supports young leaders to build the communities they want to live in both at home and around the world.

SWB makes real learning happen through 4 key strategies:

- 1. Arts-based initiatives that help young people connect with their identity;
- 2. Intensive leadership training that provides the tools and hands-on experiences for youth to take on their own projects;
- 3. Support and mentorship to create strong and sustainable platforms for change;
- 4. Institutional change through partnerships with community leaders, funding agencies, policy makers and the corporate sector.

#### 2. Safe Spaces Project Summary

*Safe Spaces* offers a positive and supportive space for young women to envision and pursue the future they want for themselves and their communities.

Safe Spaces uses accessible programming such as theatre, yoga, self-defence, dance and sports to build leadership and confidence of young women. Moreover, young women are trained in (a) Sexual health and HIV/AIDS, (b) Community leadership, (c) Vocational skills (and social enterprise), and (d) Financial literacy.

After two successful years of operation in Kenya and Botswana, SWB proposes to implement Safe Spaces for girls in Swaziland, while strengthening the existing projects. Building on lessons learned from Safe Spaces at South East District Youth Empowerment League(SEDYEL, Botswana) and the Mathare Youth Sports Association (MYSA, Kenya), the Swaziland project will enter into phase one of development in partnership with Commonwealth Games Canada and Concrete Hoops Swaziland.

#### 3. Objectives (Specific to 2008 – 2009 Programming)

- a. Establish Safe Spaces in Swaziland and strengthening Safe Spaces in Botswana and Kenya.
- b. Establish progressive knowledge and attitudes about gender, sexuality, and healthy relationships. Explore how it positively contributes to female leadership in community development.
- c. Create gender balance within partner organizations making space for women and youth to step into real decision-making positions;
- d. Safe Spaces Exchanges: Create opportunities to share expertise, skills and experience of female and youth leadership programming on municipal, regional and global platforms.

#### 4. Planned Activities – Phases of Safe Spaces

- a. Phase 1: CGC Swaziland/Concrete Hoops Mbabane, Swaziland
  - Identification of young female leaders.
  - Community consultations and focus groups held by local youth leaders.
  - Establishing SS visions specific to the location.
  - Piloting of leadership and sexual health curricula (inquiry, comfort levels, skills existing) through informal programming (dialogue, outings etc...)
  - SS Coordinator participation in regional exchange.
- b. Phase 2: SEDYEL Ramotswa, Botswana
  - Outreach by Coordinator and Zonal Leaders to adjacent neighborhoods around the host organization.
  - Establishing core groups of girls at each location.
  - Training SS Leaders in facilitation skills, sexual reproductive health, financial literacy and social enterprise.
  - Public education conducted by SS participants, supported by SS Leaders.
  - Gender sensitivity workshops for young men in the community and those working within the partner organizations.
  - Piloting of Social Enterprise initiative (examples: catering service, art collective).
  - Phase 2 reflection and visioning of Safe Spaces.
- c. Phase 3: MYSA/CFK Nairobi, Kenya
  - Training of SS Leaders to become qualified sexual health educators, implementation of sexual health curriculum, incl. dialogues on gender, homophobia, female genital mutilation, rape and harassment.
  - Citywide network and SS Mentorship Program: linking with other femalespecific groups to share best practices, recruiting 'professional' women to offer support, advice, training and a network to girls at SS.
  - Independent initiatives: requiring planning, fundraising, preparation, workshops, and exhibition.
  - Publishing materials Report back on female-centered community development, Phase 3 Strategic planning, reflection and visioning of Safe Spaces.

- d. Safe Spaces Exchanges: Exchanges offer the SS Leaders a wealth of knowledge and experience from existing projects as well as being able to uncover fresh ideas from younger programs. Exchanges offer a space for reflection and rejuvenation for projects.
  - Botswana/Swaziland visit Nairobi, Kenya;
  - Nairobi/Swaziland visit Botswana;
  - Botswana/Nairobi visit Swaziland;
  - Concrete Hoops and SWB visit Swaziland (concurrent with c.).

#### 4. Safe Spaces Building Towards

- a. Increased female capacity in (1) progressive sexual health training, (2) leadership, (3) vocational skills and (4) financial literacy.
- b. Hard skills development: program design/implementation/evaluation, budgeting, financial management, reporting, grant writing, logistics etc.
- c. Soft skills development: listening, communication, public engagement, conflict resolution, creative facilitation etc.
- d. Increased self-esteem/confidence and experience designing, running and evaluating programming
- e. Stronger financial management capacity and creation of social enterprise and incomegenerating opportunities
- f. Gender sensitivity and anti-oppression framework disseminated to larger community, especially young men working at the partner organizations.
- g. Collective and generative learning Increase knowledge of existing effective youthled development models locally and internationally.
- h. Creating more positive and safe spaces for women to achieve whatever they wish.

#### 5. Safe Spaces Outcomes and Materials

- a. Report consisting of testimonials (all genders, diversity of ages), photo journal and regional perspectives on gender to be shared widely.
- b. Flexible and comprehensive modules in (1) sexual health, (2) youth leadership, (3) vocational training and (4) financial literacy;
- c. Resource on facilitation, effective activities, role plays etc.
- d. Established citywide and regional networks of female leaders through monthly events and exchanges.
- e. Gender sensitivity module that can be shared with local, regional and international networks (ie. Regional Girls Forums, UN Habitat etc.)
- f. Final report and recommendations on continued best practices in sexual health promotion and female specific programming.
- g. Established income generating social enterprise projects such as a catering service and arts collective.
