Recommendations

The Deputy City Manager recommends that:

- 1. The General Manager, Economic Development, Culture and Tourism, in consultation with the Interdivision Economic Growth Team:
 - a. continue to implement the Agenda for Prosperity with increased focus in 2009 on expanding and deepening a Can-Do approach within the City's administration, increasing Toronto's international presence, anchoring and expanding priority industry sectors and growing strategic new sectors, and working with communities to support job creation and local hiring; and

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- b. report back to the Economic Development Committee, at least annually on significant changes in the Toronto economy and progress in implementing the Agenda for Prosperity.
- 2. A copy of this report be forwarded to:
 - a. the citizen members of the Mayor's Economic Competitiveness Advisory Committee reconfirming the City's commitment to implement the Agenda for Prosperity and work collaboratively with business, labour, educators and the community, and requesting their continued participation and support to sustain and advance Toronto's economy in these difficult economic times; and
 - b. the members of the Board of Directors of Invest Toronto and Build Toronto.

Summary

City Council unanimously endorsed the Agenda for Prosperity at its meeting one year ago (January 29 and 30, 2008) and thanked the Mayor's Economic Competitiveness Advisory Committee for their time, effort and ideas. At that time, Mayor Miller and Council committed to act on their recommendations for action to advance Toronto's economy and in so doing advance the economy of Ontario and Canada.

The Advisory Committee framed the Agenda around 4 pillars – Proactive Toronto, Global Toronto, Creative Toronto, and One Toronto – and made a total of 40 recommendations. Eight recommendations were identified as Priority Actions. At this first anniversary of Council's endorsement of the Agenda, we are pleased to report that all Priority Actions, City-Led, Partner-Led and Jointly-Led have been completed or are underway. These actions include improvements to customer service, cost competitiveness, quality of place, creative city planning framework, culture grants strategy and productive infrastructure as well as environmental initiatives, heritage and economic growth incentives, a made-in-Toronto local hiring model, and an integrated city-wide employment strategy.

The Economic Development, Culture and Tourism Division (EDCT) has been reorganized and two new corporations, Invest Toronto and Build Toronto, have been established to facilitate implementation of the Agenda for Prosperity. The Interdivisional Economic Growth Team has also been established to provide a forum for collaboration and examine new policies and programs through a business lens.

Council has kept its commitment to the Advisory Committee and acted to advance all four pillars of the Agenda for Prosperity. The new policies, programs and organizational structures are many and transformative. Our partners have also kept their commitment, these new approaches and initiatives have been developed and implemented in partnership with business, labour, educators and the community.

We will continue to advance the Agenda in 2009 focussing on expanding and deepening a Can-Do approach within the City's administration, increasing Toronto's international presence, particularly in emerging markets, anchoring and expanding priority industry sectors and growing strategic new sectors, and working with communities to support job creation and local hiring.

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Economic Development Investment and Partnership Programs Review Report

Origin

Recommendations

The Deputy City Manager recommends that:

- 1. A new Competitiveness, Creativity and Collaboration investment program be created to:
 - a. build on the fundamental principles identified in the Agenda for Prosperity;
 - b. work in partnership with business and industry non-profit organizations to improve Toronto's economic prosperity;
 - c. increase employment opportunities;
 - d. attract new investment and retain businesses; and
 - e. involve members of the business community to assist with the review and adjudication process.
- 2. Four existing grant programs, Community Festivals and Special Events (CFSE), Commercial Research Investment Program (CRIP), Economic Development Sector Investment Program (EDSIP), and the Economic Sponsorship Initiatives (ESI) Program be terminated on December 31, 2009 and all associated funds (\$456,260 in the 2008 Council approved Operating Budget) be re-allocated through the Community Partnership and Investment Program (CPIP) to a new Competitiveness, Creativity and Collaboration investment program in 2010.

3. The new Competitiveness, Creativity and Collaboration investment program be administered by the General Manager, Economic Development, Culture and Tourism Division.

Summary

At its meeting of June 12, 2008, Economic Development Committee requested the General Manager, Economic Development Culture and Tourism, to report back concerning whether the Community Festivals and Special Events (CFSE) and the Commercial Research Investment (CRIP) Programs, serving Business Improvement Areas (BIAs) and occasionally business associations, and the Economic Development Sector Investment (EDSIP) and the Economic Sponsorship Initiatives (ESI) Programs, serving industry sectors, are fulfilling their stated goals and objectives and to recommend required changes. This report responds to that request.

This report reviews these existing programs and recommends the creation of a new Competitiveness, Creativity and Collaboration grant program aligned with the Agenda for Prosperity and the Economic Development, Culture and Tourism Division's (EDCT) strategic objectives. Staff propose the establishment of a single grant program that will combine the funding of the four existing EDCT programs (CFSE, CRIP, EDSIP and ESI). The new grant program will achieve greater economic development impact, serve to anchor key industry sectors, retain and create jobs, raise public and industry interest and awareness and improve Toronto's overall business climate.

The first grant recipients for the new program would be selected and announced in the Fall 2009 for funding to be provided in 2010. It is important that the grant recipients be notified that they will be recommended for a grant in the fall of the year preceding the grant award so that they can properly plan their activities. The actual award, including the amount of the grant, will be determined once Council approves the Operating Budget for the year. The existing four programs would remain in place with current application deadlines, budget allocation and procedures in 2009.

Financial Impact

There are no direct budget implications arising from the adoption of this report. The exact amount available for this new program will be determined as a result of Council's 2009 and 2010 Operating Budget approvals and will result from the combination of the four current economic development lines in the Community Partnership and Investment Program (CPIP) as well as a two percent Cost of Living Allowance (COLA) increase. There is no requirement for other additional funding to move the Competitiveness, Creativity and Collaboration investment program forward.

Summary

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Summary

This report brings forward Business Improvement Area (BIA) annual operating budgets for approval by Council as required by the City of Toronto Act, 2006. Council approval is required to permit the City to collect funds through the tax levy on behalf of the BIAs.

Complete budgets and supporting documentation received by December 5, 2008 have been reviewed and are reported herein; BIA Operating Budgets received after this date will be brought forward in later reports. Of the 68 established BIAs, 22 BIA budgets were approved by City Council on December 1 and 2, 2008 in Report No. 1, and 36 BIA budgets are submitted for approval in this report.

The recommendations reflect 2009 Operating Budgets approved by the respective BIAs' Boards of Management and have been reviewed by City staff to ensure BIA budgets reflect Council's approved policies and practices.

Financial Impact

No City funding is required since financing of Business Improvement Area budgets is raised by a special levy on members which totals \$11,179,362 in this report.

All of the 2009 BIA operating budgets submitted for consideration are balanced budgets. The appeal provision surplus or appeal provision deficit for each BIA, as determined by the Revenue Services Division, has been addressed by the BIA and incorporated into their 2009 Operating Budget. The BIA budgets have provisions for required capital cost-sharing contributions for those projects approved in 2008 or prior and carried forward into 2009, as well as new capital cost-share projects approved in the 2009 Capital Budget for Economic Development, Culture and Tourism.
