- Background
 - Community Gardens Program (CGP) initiated in 1997 through partnership with FoodShare and Toronto Food Policy Council
 - "Just Grow It!" youth employment and mentorship project
 - Funding from Federal government, Youth Services
 Canada

Mandate

- Community Garden Action Plan (1999)
 - To establish one community garden per ward
 - To map out existing community gardens and assess need for additional community gardens
 - To Share expertise in creating and sustaining community gardens
 - To assist community gardeners through toolkit and train-the-trainer approach

- Mandate
 - Environmental Plan (2000)
 - Creation of food production pilot projects
 - Food and Hunger Action Plan (2001)
 - City departments identify underused lands or greenhouses for use by community gardeners working with CGP Co-ordinator
 - Our Common Grounds (2004)
 - Initiate a professional gardener certificate program



- Activities
 - Garden Establishment
 - Inventory of Potential Sites
 - Train-the-Trainer Toolkit
 - Community Gardening Course
 - Rockcliffe Teaching Garden & Greenhouses


- Garden Establishment
 - Program provides technical support and resources (e.g., fencing, water hook-up, shed) for gardens on City park lands
 - Various garden types (e.g., food, flower, native species)
 - Application and implementation process
 - Number of community gardens at inception of the Program in 1997: 30

- Community Gardening Course
 - Teaches basic principles and practices of organic gardening (e.g., Soil, Pests, Compost)
 - Targeted at youth and adults from vulnerable populations
 - -# youth trained since 1997: 182
 - -# youth trainees employed as PFR seasonal staff: 54 (45 visible minorities)

- Rockcliffe Teaching Garden & Greenhouses
 - Greenhouses
 - ~2,000 seedlings produced annually for community gardens and Urban Farm
 - Demonstration Garden
 - 1 acre used for production trials with heirloom and ethnocultural species (e.g., okra, eggplant, tomato)
 - Production per sq. ft.: 5-10 lbs

- Rockcliffe Teaching Garden & Greenhouses
 - Peer Nutrition Community Garden
 - Targets newcomer families (Partnership with Toronto Public Health)
 - 60 families participated since 2003
 - Junior Gardener Program
 - Targets local schools in vulnerable neighourhoods
 - 300 students participated over 3 years

ALLOTMENT GARDENS

- Administered by PFR Customer Service Section
 - Individuals follow permit process over phone;
 Staff notify applicants when plots are available
 - Fee: \$55.10 per plot (20' x 10')
 - Mostly food (some flower) cultivation
 - Gardening Season: May-Oct.
 - Wait list generated annually Feb. 1st

Background

- 8-acre property in Jane-Finch priority neighbourhood, owned by Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA)
- Operates as extension of Rockcliffe site
- 2002 TRCA requested support from CGP to implement Urban Farm concept
- 2003 Funding from Ontario Works Incentive Fund to establish Urban Farm over two-year pilot period
- 2007 Toronto City Council approved base operating budget for Urban Farm

Mandate

- To provide youth from priority neighbourhoods with life and work skills training in an urban farm setting
- To teach farming methods, gardening and horticultural skills, recreation program planning and civic engagement while promoting community safety and food security

Current Activities

- Seasonal youth employment
- Instructional and experiential youth training
- Organic production and preservation of heirloom and ethnocultural vegetables
- Children's gardening and work camps
- Food donations for community food programs
- Public education (e.g., tours, presentations)



- Future Activities
 - Food sales to specialized caterers, restaurants, and farmers markets
 - Research & evaluation
 - Seniors' programming
 - Community composting

Key Performance Indicators

- Trained and employed 50 youth (47 visible minorities) since 2003
- Conducted farm installation using mainly manual labour
- Produced food on 40,000 sq. ft. of land
- Hosted 15 work camps for schools, faith groups, and community agencies
- Held 3 end-of-season community celebrations in 2005, 2007, and 2008
- Conducted gardening, fitness, and chess programming with XCELCare Outreach Inc.
