THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE MIRVISH VILLAGE BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT AREA NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2009

1. ESTABLISHMENT AND OPERATIONS

The Mirvish Village Business Improvement Area (BIA) is established as a Business Improvement Area under the management and control of a Board of Management appointed by Council of the City of Toronto.

The Board is entrusted with the improvements, beautification and maintenance of municipally owned lands, buildings and structures in the area, together with the promotion of the area as a business or shopping area. Funding is provided by property owners of the BIA who are levied a special charge based on an annual operating budget prepared by the Board and approved by Council under Section 220(17) of the Municipal Act, as amended.

2. Change In Basis Of Presentation For 2009

For fiscal year commencing on January 1, 2009 the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA) has required that the accounting recommendations and disclosure requirements, as prescribed by the Public Sector Accounting Board of The Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants, be adopted for use by Ontario municipalities and their local boards and agencies. As a result, the Board has implemented accounting policies as recommended. The implementation of these policies has resulted in the Board changing its method of accounting for capital assets, on a retroactive basis, from expensing them when purchased to capitalizing and amortizing them over their estimated useful lives.

The effect of these changes has been to increase capital assets and surplus by \$1,257 as at December 31, 2009 (2008 – increase \$nil), and decrease expenses by \$1,257 for the year ended December 31, 2009 (2008 – decrease expenses by \$nil).

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements are the representation of management and have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for local governments as prescribed by the Public Sector Accounting Board (PSAB) of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA), the most significant of which are as follows:

- (a) Revenues and expenditures are recorded using the accrual basis of accounting.
- (b) Capital assets

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is calculated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets as follows:

Banners 3 years
Street & Christmas lights 5 years
Street furniture 5 years
Planters 5 years

(c) Services provided without charge by the City of Toronto and others are not recorded in these financial statements

4. CITY OF TORONTO - SPECIAL CHARGES

Special charges levied by the City are collected and remitted to the Board by the City. The total special charges outstanding consist of amounts collected by the City not yet remitted to the Board and amounts uncollected by the City.

The Board records special charges receivable net of an allowance for uncollected amounts. The special charges receivable from the City of Toronto are comprised of:
