Recommendations:

The Toronto Pedestrian Committee recommended to the Public Works and Infrastructure Committee:

- 1. The General Manager, Transportation Services, be requested to review the Official Ministry of Transportation of Ontario Driver's Handbook and recommend changes to the Handbook, for consideration by the Government of Ontario, that would better educate drivers on sharing the road with cyclists, pedestrians, and public transit vehicles with an eye towards a safer and more inclusive road environment for all users.
- 2. The General Manager, Transportation Services, be requested to develop recommendations, for consideration by the Government of Ontario, to improve the ongoing training of Driving Instructors on sharing the road with cyclists, pedestrians and public transit vehicles with an eye towards a safer and more inclusive road environment for all users.

Background:

The Toronto Pedestrian Committee on September 22, 2009, considered a communication (August 6, 2009) from Councillor Joe Mihevo, requesting that the Committee request staff to review the Driver's Education Manual and suggest changes to the Province that would better educate drivers on sharing the road with cyclists, pedestrians, and public transit vehicles with an eye towards a safer and more inclusive road environment for all users.

Dear Public Works and Infrastructure Committee members,

I regret that I am not able to be present to discuss my memo of August 6, 2009 regarding "Changes to the Driver's Education Manual."

That memo resulted from discussion and request from Yvonne Bambrick, Executive Director of the Toronto Cyclists Union. The Toronto Cyclists Union, whose mandate is to provide a "vibrant and amplified voice to achieve the common goals of safety, legitimacy and accessibility of cycling in Toronto," has been advocating for some time now that a key element of improving cycling in Toronto is to better educate all road users on the rules of the road and how to share it.

One element of the Cyclists Union's multi-faceted education campaigns is to request the Ministry of Transportation to update the Driver's Education Manual to include additional information about cycling safety and sharing the road with cyclists, pedestrians and transit users.

I am pleased that Public Works and Infrastructure will be taking up this request and look forward to seeing staff's recommendations on appropriate updates to the manual. I would encourage the Committee and staff to include members of the cycling, pedestrian, and public transit advocacy communities in their discussions on appropriate changes.
