He held a Bachelor of Mathematics from the University of Waterloo, graduating in 1977 with a discipline in Accounting and Finance, and Computer Science and Information Systems.

John was known for delivering the corporate courses called Financial Management for Non-financial Managers to staff across the City and for presenting the City's budget to foreign delegations, all in an effort to share his civic pride.

Most importantly, John was a personable, positive influence on those that worked for him and with him. He was never one to hold back a word of praise or encouragement.

Whether it was his prowess on the golf course, the years coaching baseball along with Councillor Cliff Jenkins or his great sense of humour, John was never short of a story. He will truly be missed at City Hall.
