Affordable Housing in Toronto: The Context

- Core Housing Need: 23% or 216,070 households live in housing that is too small, in need of repairs or is too expensive.
- New Affordable Construction: 1,073 new affordable homes were approved through government programs in 2010.
- New Private Construction: Out of 10,251 new homes built last year,
 731 were purpose-built rental housing.
- Existing Rental Housing: 45% of residents rent. Much of Toronto's rental housing is aging and needs repair.




Affordable Housing in Toronto: The Context

- Vacancy Rates: Vacancy rates have dropped from 3.1% to 2.2% since last year. In October 2010, 5,532 apartments were vacant out of 254,555.
- Average Rents: Average rents for a bachelor, one-, two- and three bedroom apartments are \$778, \$950, \$1135 and \$1346.
- Social Housing Wait List: There are currently 76,549 households on the wait list. In Toronto, there are 99,047 social housing units.
- **Population Projections:** Increase from 2.6 to 2.9 million people by 2020 with more seniors (103,120), children (39,870) and working-age people (122,580).

Affordable Housing:

- Creates jobs, attracts and retains skilled key workers and business investment
- Creates healthy, diverse and prosperous neighbourhoods
- Creates savings in health, education, criminal justice and social service systems




The Role of the Affordable Housing Committee

Oversees the delivery of:

- Federal and provincial government investments in new affordable rental and ownership housing in partnership with private and non-profit developers
- Federal funds to repair and modify the homes of low- and modest-income seniors, persons with disabilities and families
- Housing Opportunities Toronto, the City's 10-year affordable housing action plan
- Partnerships with private and non-profit sectors
- Innovation in demonstration and pilot projects

The Affordable Housing Office: Services to Residents

Housing Improvement Programs

- Assists low- and moderate-income owners and renters through the repair and/or modification of 800 homes/rental units annually.
- Administers some \$8 million annually in federal loans to low- and moderate-income homeowners/landlords.

New Affordable Housing Development

 Meets the housing needs of low- and moderate-income residents through the delivery of mandated federal/provincial funding to Council-approved new affordable rental and ownership housing through the Canada-Ontario Affordable Housing Program.

Housing Policy & Partnerships

 Supports the activities of the Affordable Housing Office through research, program and policy analysis, co-ordinates the implementation of Toronto's Councilapproved10-year affordable housing plan, and maintains relations with external partners.

The Affordable Housing Office: 2011 Objectives

Creating Housing and Jobs Through Housing Investments

- Record year in 2011: more affordable homes under construction than at any other time in the last 15 years helping seniors, persons with disabilities and low- and moderate-income families and workers. More than 3,200 rental and ownership homes being created or modified.
- Delivering \$153 million in federal/provincial economic stimulus funding, leveraging investment from the private and non-profit sectors, and creating some 3,400 jobs.




The Affordable Housing Office: 2011 Objectives

Affordable Housing Policies and Program Services

- 2011 will see the first homeowners assisted by the City's new Home Ownership Assistance Program occupy their homes.
 - \$4 million in home ownership assistance loans to help 395 new home buyers.
- Helping low- and moderate-income seniors and homeowners with disabilities in need of housing repairs.
- Continuing to co-ordinate implementation of Housing Opportunities
 Toronto's 67 actions across several City Divisions, Agencies and
 other partners.



Investments in Affordable Housing

- In the last 10 years, federal/provincial governments have invested \$359 million in new initiatives helping 11,559 families and individuals:
 - \$289.9 million in the Affordable Housing Program has created
 4,653 new affordable rental and ownership homes
 - \$69.4 million in the Residential Rehabilitation Assistance
 Program and Home Adaptations for Seniors Independence
 has assisted 6,906 households
- Renewal of these federal/provincial programs from April 1, 2011 to March 31, 2014 is anticipated in Spring 2011.
