Community Safety Investment Program – 2012 Allocation Recommendations

SUMMARY

This report recommends allocations for funding under the 2012 Community Safety Investment Program. Of the 59 applications received 17 are recommended for funding of \$665,600.00. An amount of \$31,200.00 has been held for appeals.

The mission of the Community Safety Investment program is to create safe communities for people in Toronto. The Community Safety Investment program makes resources available to organizations that are in a unique position to reach vulnerable communities with information, prevention activities and situation-specific responses that help create safer places for everyone.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Executive Director, Social Development, Finance and Administration recommends that:

- 1. City Council approve the 2012 Community Safety Investment Program (Community Safety) allocations totalling \$665,600.00 to 17 organizations as recommended in Appendices A and B;
- 2. An amount of \$31,200.00 be held for appeals;

3. This report be forwarded to the Community Development and Recreation Committee for consideration at its meeting of June 26, 2012.

Financial Impact

The recommendations in this report will have no impact beyond what has already been approved in the current year's budget.

The Social Development, Finance and Administration Division 2012 Approved Operating Budget includes funding of \$696,800.00 for the Community Safety Investment Program. This report recommends allocations for 17 organizations totalling \$665,600.00, with an appeal fund of \$31,200.00.

The Deputy City Manager and Chief Financial Officer has reviewed this report and agrees with the financial impact information.

DECISION HISTORY

The City of Toronto provides support to the not-for-profit sector through funding programs under the general authority for making municipal grants provided in Section 83 of the *City of Toronto Act, 2006* (S.O. 2006, c.11).

ISSUE BACKGROUND

The Community Safety Plan is guided by three principles: a balance between enforcement and prevention; investment in youth; and building on the strengths of neighbourhoods and communities. Community Safety Investment program (CSI) supports these principles by continuing to fund projects that focus on preventing violence and respond to the needs of youth. CSI criteria encourage applications from organizations that work actively to build on the strengths of neighbourhoods and communities.

By working through community-based organizations, the City is able to support a broader range of safety and violence prevention opportunities including for ethno-cultural communities and equity-seeking groups, than it would be able to offer on its own.

Not everyone is equally affected by violence. People's experiences and perceptions of safety vary depending on age, gender, income levels, race, access to information, available resources and a variety of other circumstances. Communities have different assets and different structural issues to address. In order to ensure that the CSI project funding will have a significant impact, grants are directed to vulnerable communities.

As outlined in the CSI guidelines, priority is given to projects addressing the safety and violence prevention needs of children and youth, women and girls, people with disabilities, seniors, the Aboriginal community, immigrants and refugees, LGBTTQ community and neighbourhoods.

COMMENTS

Application Process

Guidelines and on-line registration for the 2012 Community Safety were available in February with a submission deadline of March 21, 2012. Three information sessions on the purpose and process for the funding program were provided during February and March and attended b y 60 people. Applicants were also able to speak with Community Resources staff by telephone or schedule meetings to ask questions or get help with their applications.

For the second year, the CSI forms were provided through the Corporate Grants information System, the City's online funding database. Applicants were required to register for a username and password, which then provided internet based access to the required forms from any internet based computer. The online funding system is part of the City's plan to manage funding program requests and grant recipient reporting more efficiently.

A total of 115 groups registered for access to the Community Safety online application. Ten online training sessions were delivered to over eighty participants. Fifty-nine (59) completed and submitted the Community Safety application by the deadline date.

CSI and three other investment programs were managed on-line in 2012 and drew 325 organization registrations. In order to help assess the impact of the online process for applicants, registered organizations were asked to complete a survey on their experience and suggestions. Of the 63 organizations that have completed the survey to date, most indicated they were satisfied with the experience. Staff will use the detailed survey responses to continue improvements to the on-line process for the 2013 funding cycle.

Assessment of Applications

A total of 59 applications were submitted. In order to be recommended for funding, applicants must meet common eligibility criteria which are provided in the CSI program guidelines <u>http://www.toronto.ca/grants/csi/index.htm</u>. Core eligibility requirements include: non-profit status, demonstrated financial accountability, willingness to with a trustee organization if they are not incorporated, and located in the City of Toronto.

The assessment process includes a review of the organization's documents, progress reports, administrative and human resource capacity, audited financial statements and evidence that the project budget is viable and reasonable.

The assessment process may include site visits, telephone calls or meetings with applicants, with particular attention to new applicants and applications from emerging communities. Assessment of previously funded applicants considers their track record in providing progress and final reports on the implementation and outcomes of previously funded activities. Staff may also attend annual general meetings and other programs

offered by organizations as well as contact other funders for budget or project related information.

The assessment process determines the extent to which proposed events are feasible, leverage other resources (including in-kind sources and partnerships), involve volunteers and participants in the activities, and have the potential to achieve specific results in terms of increasing the capacity of organizations and communities to address safety and violence-prevention issues through outcome-focussed, time-limited activities.

2012 Allocations Recommendations

Of the 59 applications received, 17 are recommended for funding and 42 are not recommended for support. Seven of the recommendations are for organizations that received funding in 2011 for a multi-year project: these projects have been determined to be meeting their goals, and the second or third (final) year of funding is recommended. Nine recommendations are for new project that did not receive funding in 2011.

The average grant size in the program is \$39,150.00. Of the 17 projects recommended, 9 will be delivered in a priority neighbourhood, five will work in other neighbourhoods and three have a city-wide focus. The CSI investment of \$665,600.00 will leverage an additional \$178,000.00 in funding from other sources, as well as the participation of 570 volunteers. The recommended project activities are expected to involve more than 5,000 participants.
