Council Direction

June 2011:

Council directed staff to develop a strategic plan for seniors in consultation with other levels of government, school boards, relevant community organizations and individuals, businesses and academia to ensure that it is truly comprehensive, adequately funded, financially feasible and able to be implemented.



CDR Subcommittee Mandate

 To provide advice and input on the development of a seniors strategy; and

 To meet a maximum of four (4) times to the end of the 2010-2014 or until Council approves a Seniors Strategy






Recommendations by Jurisdiction











Recommendations by Theme




