SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to provide the status of the Auditor General's 2014 Audit Work Plan to the Audit Committee and City Council. The status of individual audit projects included in 2014 Audit Work Plan is attached as Appendix 1 to this report.

For 2014, there are no scheduled Audit Committee meetings after June 27, 2014. Consequently all audits completed after June 2014 will be reported in 2015.

The 2014 Audit Work Plan provides a balance of audit work that will result in improving overall City operations by identifying potential risks, strengthening management controls, improving accountability and enhancing the efficiency and effectiveness of City services.

COMMENTS

The Auditor General submits an audit work plan each year to the Audit Committee and City Council. The purpose of the Auditor General's Work Plan is to provide Audit Committee and Council with an overview of how resources allocated to the Auditor General's Office are used during the year.

The Audit Work Plan is a combination of audits in progress, new audit projects, annual recurring projects and investigative work carried out as a result of complaints received through the Fraud and Waste Hotline. The Audit Work Plan also includes a formal follow-up review to ensure recommendations contained in previously issued audit and investigative reports have been implemented.

Audit projects included in the audit plan vary in scope and size and therefore require different timelines. Projects initiated late in the year are carried forward to the next year.

The 2014 work plan included 2013 work plan projects already in progress at the beginning of 2014 and new audit projects initiated during 2014. A project reporting status summary is provided in Table 1 below.
