To Members of the Licensing and Standards committee:

The Toronto Paramedic Association is the professional body that advances the profession of Paramedicine, advocates on behalf of practitioners and patients and serves our members in the City of Toronto. Public safety and patient advocacy are one of our key goals. We are not a labour union.

We understand that there has been a shortcoming in regards to the enforcement of city bylaws as they relate to apartment building standards. Namely the safety of apartment stairwell railings, handrails and guardrails under Toronto Municipal code 629.

Paramedics and other emergency workers regularly use building stairwells in the course of their duties. The safe upkeep of these areas is imperative to ensure the safety of both emergency workers and residents. As well, maintenance of these standards serves to prevent illness and injury. The City of Toronto has a duty to ensure compliance with these standards therefore providing both a safe living and working environment for all.
