Stafford made each child feel special and unique.

Stafford's ongoing commitment to the safety of Runnymede Public School's students, and to the neighbourhood at large, as well as his positive presence, have helped make Bloor West Village a better place to live. The community shared their love of Stafford when he was voted "Canada's Favourite Crossing Guard" in 2011.

Stafford retired in June of 2016 after 21 years as the crossing guard from Runnymede Public School.
