PH 11.4 Official Plan Review: Final Recommendation Report -Amendments to the Built Form and Public Realm Policies of the Official Plan

Dear Chair Ana Bailao and Members of the Planning & Housing Committee,

FoNTRA has participated in a number of consultations during the development of these comprehensive new policies, and most recently met with City Planning staff to review our concerns during the development process, including those outlined in our October 17 2019 letter regarding the broader context of the policies.

We support the proposed policies as set out in the final report - Amendments to the Built Form and Public Realm Policies of the Official Plan. We believe that as development densities increase, attention to built form and public realm policies are increasingly important. We particularly support the requirement for submission of Context Plans, as applications are frequently made where context is either not considered or insufficiently. Residents raise such issues at public meetings and in objections to the application. Too much time is wasted in the staff review to ensuring a better fit.
