

Opioid overdose deaths in Toronto







Impacts of COVID-19 on people who use drugs

- The full impacts are not yet known
- Preliminary reports:
 - Reduction in services
 - Fear of criminalization
 - Change in the availability of drugs
 - Increased need for safer supply
 - Concerns over exposure to COVID-19

Focus of TPH Response

- Implementing the Toronto Overdose Action Plan, and addressing emerging issues.
- Advocacy to advance key policy issues.
- Monitoring & reporting new data: 11 drug alerts issued during the pandemic.
- Delivery of harm reduction services through The Works, and supporting other harm reduction programs and City divisions.

Federal government:

- decriminalize simple possession of all drugs for personal use
- scale up prevention, harm reduction and treatment services
- expand funding for safer supply programs

Recommendations

Provincial government:

- convene an opioid task force
- support safer supply programs
- create an Urgent Public Health Need Sites program
- support expansion of supervised consumption services + models

Recommendations

Provincial government:

- allocate some of the new treatment funding to Toronto
- designate harm reduction and treatment services as essential services + fund appropriately
- fund grief and trauma supports

 Medical Officer of Health to work with the Executive Director of SDFA to include decriminalization in the City's Community Safety and Wellbeing Plan.
