Dear SafeTO Committee Members:

I am writing to support the initiatives of SafeTO, the City's 10-year Community Safety and Well-Being Plan.

In response to Homelessness and the Covid-19 Crisis, the City of Toronto has supported the opening of Shelter Hotels and associated Community Engagement Strategies in the form of Community Liaison Committees (CLC) and operative partnership engagements in neighbourhoods where these Shelter Hotel Programs are located. These initiatives have afforded us unique opportunities to convene unlikely partners to re-envision what a safe city can be.
