### Protecting People Experiencing Homelessness from COVID-19








- The City has taken significant action to protect people experiencing homelessness from COVID-19 in the shelter system
- Three-tier Strategy
  - Prevention
  - Mitigation
  - Recovery
- We continue to work closely and collaboratively with partners from the homelessness service sector, the health sector and other levels of government






#### Active outbreaks in shelters







## Opening temporary shelter sites to ensure physical distancing in the shelter system



#### Response Measures

- Ensure physical distancing by issuing Shelter Directive related to bed spacing, and encouraging physical distancing in all areas of the shelter, including washrooms, dining and common areas
- Transporting more than 1,900 people with symptoms to provincial assessment sites for testing
- Working with Ontario Health Toronto Region and hospital partners to deliver on-site testing as recommended by Toronto Public Health
- Operating an isolation and recovery program with wrap-around health and harm reduction supports for more than 3,600 people who await test results or test positive to recover
- Proactive symptom screening at all points of entry into the shelter system and active daily screening and monitoring of all clients and staff for COVID-19 symptoms
- Piloting rapid testing screening for new admissions










- Ensuring the mandatory use of masks for staff throughout shifts and issuing a directive for mandatory masks or face coverings for clients in all common areas
- Continuing distribution of an average of approximately 100,000 pieces of personal protective equipment (PPE) weekly
- Providing funding to non-profit shelter providers for direct purchase of PPE and to support implementation of enhanced IPAC measures
- Providing guidance and funding for improvements to ventilation and indoor air quality
- IPAC leads at each shelter are coordinating IPAC work and focusing on continuous improvement
- Conducting ongoing quality assurance site visits to confirm compliance with IPAC measures and providing direction and education for remediation where required




#### Vaccination of Service Users in the Shelter System

Number and proportion of current service users with 1st dose vaccine




Programs reporting > 65% vaccination




- Programs with 65% or more of current service users 1st dose vaccinated

#### **Overdose Prevention**

- SSHA worked closely with TPH and community partners to take action to address opioid-related deaths in Toronto's shelter system.
- The <u>Integrated Prevention and Harm Reduction Initiative</u>, or iPHARE, was established to address this request and help to advance the <u>Toronto Overdose Action Plan</u>.
- iPHARE establishes Supervised Consumption Sites at several locations, and includes investments over \$7 million for harm reduction and mental health case management supports at shelter and hotel locations with the highest needs.
- Shelter Hotel Overdose Prevention Project (SHOPP) is a Peer witnessing program funded and deployed in four shelter – hotel programs
- SSHA in collaboration with TPH, has issued an updated directive for City operated and funded shelters and 24-hour respite sites, including the COVID-19 hotel programs. The directive provides updated requirements for overdose prevention and response strategies along with a toolkit of resources to support service providers.
