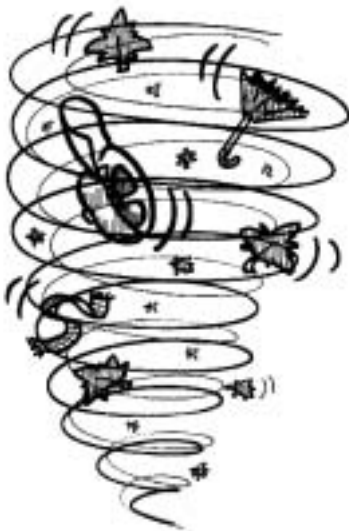


NAME THAT EMERGENCY!

Read the clues and study the picture, then pick the correct name from the list of emergency situations. Draw a line from the picture to the name and you're done!



One of these took Dorothy to the Land of Oz, but in real life they can be very dangerous and cause a lot of damage. It's best to get underground during one if you can, like in a basement. If that's not an option then you should take shelter in a small room, hallway or stairwell. Make sure you are away from windows!

These situations are sometimes called a "blackout" because if they occur at night it can be very dark. They usually don't last too long but you should turn off major sources (like air conditioners and dryers) so it's easy to restore the power. If candles are used during this time for light they should be handled carefully by adults - but flashlights are safe for kids!



This situation can be a pretty scary one but if you keep a cool head and remember follow instructions you should be fine.
