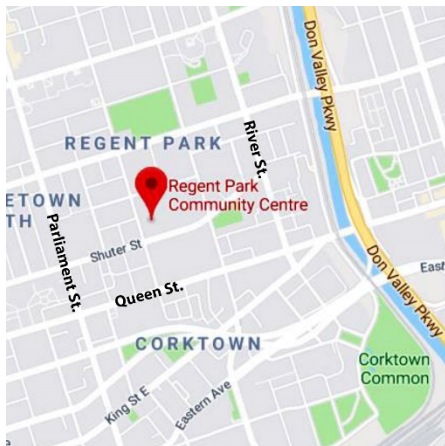


Lower Don Trail – Master Plan Refresh

Where is the Lower Don Trail study site?

The site is located in Toronto East York (see map), bounded by Corktown Commons to the south, ET Seton Park to the north, and comprises all ravine lands between these points. Additionally, the study includes considerations to communities that are adjacent to the study area.

Background

The City of Toronto previously developed in 2013 the *'Lower Don Trail: Access, Environment + Art Master Plan'*. The purpose of the *'Refresh'* is to build on its predecessor by;

- Applying the principals of Access, Environment & Art into an expanded study area
- Coordinating with relevant City plans, strategies and new development proposals that are next to or may have influence on the study area
- Recognize and celebrate recently completed work, as well as identifying upcoming works
- Develop strategies for users to better engage with the trail network and ravine system

This high-level study intends to build project recommendations and strategies to help the City prioritize future actions within the Lower Don. The City is looking for public input to help inform the Study's final recommendations.
