- The most used trails are the Monument and Gardens Walk and the Waterfront Trail




















PILLARS OF THE GUILD PARK AND GARDENS MANAGEMENT PLAN














WEST TRAIL AREA
















MONUMENT WALK & GARDENS
















EAST TRAIL AREA

SAFE ACCESS TO EDGE OF BLUFF






