AMENDMENT 407 TO THE FORMER CITY OF TORONTO OFFICIAL PLAN FOR LOWER DON FLOOD PROTECTION - CITY-OWNED LANDS

The Former Official Plan of the Former City of Toronto is amended as follows:

Section 18: Exceptions, Special Amendments and Modifications, Maps is amended by adding the following new policy 709:

- City-owned lands located within the area shown on the map below are exempt from policy 4.5 of this Plan, which prohibit the disposal of City-owned lands designated Open Space on Map 1 - Land Use and in the Central Waterfront Secondary Plan designated as Parks as specified, provided that, as part of any agreement to transfer any lands specified in the map below, any transferred lands will continue to be designated Open Space in Map 1 - Land Use and/or designated as Parks and Open Space in the Central Waterfront Secondary Plan, and
 - (i) a transfer of City-owned land is supported by a Council-approved Environmental Assessment, Council-approved Plan, or Council-approved Study;
 - (ii) a transfer of City-owned land designated Parks and Open Space Areas will not preclude public access, and will not significantly reduce the size, functionality, or programming of the land; and
 - (iii) the lands are transferred to utilities or Crown corporations for the purposes of the establishment of a long-term easement.
