Public spending on ECEC programs is increasing.





Good Early Childhood Education programs are good for children and families. **

** Most research in this area is based on samples of children from deprived backgrounds.



Context: What is quality?

Good ECEC programs:

- Provide warm and nurturing environments
- Provide activities and materials that children can interact with and that have been selected by staff to further specific educational goals
- Provide children with useful and supportive feedback about their own performance
- Meet the needs of children from diverse backgrounds who have different learning needs



But how do we know if our programs are good?



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- We can't rely on parents because lots of research shows that parents are not good at identifying program quality
- We need external ratings of quality in monitoring quality



- Quality Improvement
- Public Education
- Accountability



Rating systems are used as part of accountability systems to drive improvement



Test scores have consequences associated with them.

Quality measures must be:

• Fair



Quality measures must be:

(The measure actually tests what it's supposed to measure)



Quality measures must be:

- Fair.
 - Valid
 - Reliable

(The measure must be applied objectively)



Reliability across observers, time & location



- Fair
 - Valid
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- Include objective measures

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 - Cost of monitoring must be minimized

Quality measures must be:

- Fair
- Include objective measures
- Efficient

To achieve these standards quality monitoring must be *empirically based*

Monitoring Quality: What the City does

The City operates an accountability system that meets all of these criteria



Monitoring Quality: What the City does

 Developed their own measure – the Operating Criteria

36 observational items on a 4-point scale Capture the following constructs:

- Physical Environment
- Interactions
- Structure of the Day
- Activities/Experiences Planned
- Learning
- Physical Needs
- Health and Safety



Monitoring Quality: What the City does

- Conducts annual assessments
- Tested the validity of the Operating Criteria
- Developed/implemented a protocol for conducting assessments
- This took many years and a lot of "brain power"



Monitoring Quality: How Operating Criteria

- Valid, efficient, global, Canadian
- Administration takes much less time than other measures do



Monitoring Quality: Barriers?

Culture

The city has done a wonderful job of overcoming resistance from various parties

Cost

Not so large when we keep the magnitude of spending in mind.



Conclusions:

- The city of Toronto is running a high quality accountability system that serves multiple purposes
- It is running the system in an empirically based, fair and cost efficient way
- The city is the national leader in this area



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
