Dear City Councillors,

We wish to extend a warm greeting on behalf of the Canadian Paralympic Committee (CPC).

The CPC is responsible for creating an optimal environment for high-performance Canadian Paralympic athletes to compete and win in the Paralympic and Parapan American Games, and by promoting their success, to inspire all Canadians with a disability to get involved in sport.

We are looking forward with great anticipation to the Toronto 2015 Parapan American Games to be held from August 7 to 14, 2015.

It has been brought to our attention that Councillors are to vote on designating the Back Campus Playing Fields at the University of Toronto as a cultural heritage landscape – a move which would prohibit its improvement with synthetic turf and **disqualify it from being a venue for the TO2015 Games**.

We respectfully urge all Councillors to vote against this motion. Why? The reasons include:

- **Opportunity**: World-class venues are important for Canadian athletes as well as the host community. Hosting international events sparks athletic participation and inspires a generation! The U of T has this opportunity at its doorstep.
- Accessibility: The upgrading of the fields will enable people with a disability to take part in sport and physical
 activities in a safe and welcoming environment. Soccer players with cerebral palsy (7-a-side) or a visual
 impairment (5-a-side) cannot play on fields in the current state of disrepair.
- Legacy: Long after the Games are over, the new fields will significantly enhance sport and physical activity at the U of T and within the downtown area. The site will serve as a training, development and competition venue for years to come, for athletes at all levels.
