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2015 OPERATING BUDGET BRIEFING NOTE Itemized Budget Allocations Across Divisions for Urban Agricultural Initiatives

Issue/Background:

- At its meeting on February 4, 2015, the Budget Committee requested the Deputy City Manager Cluster A to provide a Briefing Note to itemize budget lines across divisions that support the urban agriculture initiatives in the City of Toronto.
- The City of Toronto urban agriculture initiatives support and coordinate Toronto's communities in the production, consumption and sale of locally-grown food, farmers' markets, waiting lists for space at City community and allotment gardens, and new urban farms, social enterprises and new partnerships.

GrowTO: An Urban Agriculture Action Plan for Toronto, is the result of over three years of collaborative work by community and institutional stakeholders from various City Divisions and Agencies, (adopted by City Council in November, 2012).

Toronto Agricultural Program (**TAP**) work plan (Council November, 2013) identifies a series of immediate, short-term and longer-term activities aligned with *GrowTO* priority areas that can be implemented within existing resources. It also presents potential for extending existing partnerships to promote growth of the agricultural sector across the city.

TAP consists of three main elements: a City-Sector Urban Agricultural Steering Committee, a staff Working Group, and a 2013-2014 Work Plan of activities which include:

- 1) Supporting promotion of agricultural activities; and
- 2) Facilitating access to land for agriculture; and
- 3) identifying and addressing policy barriers to the expansion of agriculture in Toronto.
- The Divisions providing support to this initiative through specific line items are included in the chart below. Other Divisions such as City Planning, and the Environment & Energy Division have absorbed costs for *TAP* into their existing services.

Key Points:

As noted in the table below, the 2015 Recommended Operating Budget includes \$1.622 million gross and \$1.376 million net to fund Urban Agriculture initiatives, with programming in Economic Development, Parks Forestry and Recreation, Social Development Finance and Administration, and Toronto Public Health. The 2016 projections are \$1.351 million gross and \$1.109 million net, and provide for on-going programming. The reduction from 2016 is primarily

due to the reduction in funding from the Toronto Business Incubator, reflecting the completion of the capital project.

- 1. Community Gardens and Allotment Gardens expenses and revenue.

Questions & Answers:

- **Q**: Are there other divisions providing support to the Urban Agriculture Program that do not have budget allocations listed here?
- A: City Planning identifies options through planning instruments, such as the Green Roof and Zoning Bylaws, for encouraging more enterprise-based farming in the City. The Division's work and participation on the Urban Agriculture Steering Committee and Working Group forms part of its general work program for 2015/2016 and has not been identified as a separate line item in the budget.

The Environment & Energy Division does not have any projects or initiatives that are specific to urban agriculture. Rather encouraging local food production is one of the key messages marketed through the Live Green Toronto initiative.

One area of note is the Live Green Toronto Community Fund which is entering its final year (2015). Community groups can apply for a grant of up to \$25,000 in support of their community led environmental initiatives, such as local food production activities. On average, about 15% of this grant fund has gone towards community led local food production activities. The amount varies from year to year depending upon the number and type of grant applications received during the year.

Toronto & Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) advances and provides varied supports to the future of urban agriculture such as Rouge Park, the Living City Farm, Black Creek Community Farm sustainable institutional procurement models.

TRCA's Sustainable Neighbourhood Retrofit Action Plan (SNAP) Program supports the development of new local community gardens, fruit orchards and works in partnership with community groups in enhance urban agriculture skills training and social enterprise.

Additional resources exist within Toronto Public Health for broader food security /food access programming.

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
