For example, increasing the nomination filing fee and/or requiring a certain number of endorsements from residents.

Election campaign finances rules should be clearer particularly related to fundraising. Spending limits should be higher in Toronto given the costs of running a campaign in Toronto are higher. There was limited support for using ranked ballots for some municipal jurisdiction and not others; consistency is desirable. Consultation and/or the requirement to hold a referendum is advisable prior to the implementation of ranked ballots. Sufficient time and resources will be required for public education and outreach prior to implementing ranked ballots.
