Dear Chair Augimeri and Members of Committee:

This is to express the strong support of the Federation of North Toronto Residents Assns (FoNTRA) for the staff report and recommendations regarding the above noted item. Given its centrality in a our area, adjacent to the Yonge Eglinton "centre", FoNTRA has maintained a key interest in this proposal due to its potential to set an undesirable precedent for neighborhoods across the City, if approved.

It is our view that the proposal does not conform to the Official Plan's Neighbourhoods policies and it is an inappropriate development for this site.

- It does not reinforce the existing physical character of the neighbourhood.
- It does not respect the prevailing building types in the neighbourhood. It introduces a new building type into the neighbourhood, stacked townhouses, representing a "building behind a building", which has increased building height, reduced setbacks, and reduced green space.
- It creates unacceptable building relationships within the site and with abutting buildings resulting in negative impacts with respect to privacy, overlook and fit.
- The proposal does not fit the existing or planned context of the neighbourhood and would significantly alter the character of the neighbourhood.

We appreciate the thoughtful and well-written staff report and endorse the staff recommendations.
