












2014 Employment by Sector






47.9% of all jobs in Toronto reside in the Office sector




The Institutional sector was the fastest growing sector in 2014, up 4.9%

Employment by Sector 2004-2014









Evolution of the Retail Sector




Over 30 years:



57% of jobs are located in the Downtown, Centres and Employment Districts










