## PG8.12 Townhouse and Low-Rise Apartment Guidelines Project

Dear Chair Shiner and Members of the Committee:

FoNTRA provides the following comments on the Draft Guidelines dated October 2015. In the Staff Report before the Committee, it is noted that FoNTRA's letter of August 5, 2015 endorsed the Draft Guidelines in principle as an important educational tool with the potential of informing all stakeholders, including developers, resident groups, politicians, and appeal bodies. The October 15 version provides an improved coordinated and comprehensive presentation of the information that will be helpful for residents and applicants, architects and designers and developers in the actual design and review of relevant projects.

However in reviewing the latest draft document, FoNTRA remains concerned that the Guidelines insufficiently refer both to the relevant Official Plan policies, and to the applicable zoning regulations throughout the document. Under Ontario's statutory planning framework, design guidelines have no status beyond assisting in the interpretation of the relevant policy and regulatory provisions. Therefore, more explicit clarity is required.

When the Harmonized Zoning By-law was developed, the City repeatedly acknowledged that there was a need to refine it - in a second phase - with area-specific Zoning By-law amendments. In FoNTRA's view, Design Guidelines, although valuable implementation tools, are no substitute for Secondary Plans with implementing zoning regulations that reflect particular neighbourhood characteristics.
