# City halts CP Rail project

# Eggleton retaliates for 'sneaky' razing of rail station

Toronto Mayor Art Eggle-ton ordered a "dead halt" to a billion-dollar downtown development planner by CP Rail in retaliation for the "sneaky" demolition of the historic West Toronto rail-

"As much as we need that development. I'm not going to sit here and do nothing while they deliberately flout the law' an angry Eggleton said yesterday.

In a telegram to CP Rail president W. W. Stinson. Eggleton said the company will be prosecuted for this "illegal act, which amounts to vandelism and corporate irresponsibility."
