## Comments:

Toronto's Entertainment District is flourishing with new mixed use developments, new workers and a burgeoning residential population. Our sidewalks are packed with pedestrians, including most lately a noticeable increase in young children. Representing a struggling residents association, we are striving, with the encouragement of our Councillor and advice from City officials, to ensure liveability and above all, a safe environment. While in past years, it may have appeared to city residents beyond the city core that downtown was exclusively a place of business, the Entertainment District is now a heavily populated residential district. When it comes to safety, the protection of lives must rank beyond the concern for moving traffic expeditiously. The only traffic control at this intersection is a flashing red light which has little or no impact on fast breaking traffic crossing University Ave, or right turning vehicles from University anxious to make up time.
