Dear Toronto Preservation Board Members,

Although this property is a couple of blocks west of the borders of Corktown, it is part of the east end of Toronto which we call home. Being part of the original 10 blocks of the City of Toronto it is more important than ever to ensure that we maintain historically significant buildings which abound in this location. A walk around the block will reveal many heritage stories, not just on King Street but on Ontario, Adelaide, and Princess Streets also.

Development will happen; however it is our responsibility to make sure that development includes preserving the history of our city and that new buildings fit into the character of the neighbourhood. While not necessarily within the mandate of the Preservation Board, this development is totally out of context; it is simply too large. But it also pays only lip service to the heritage which exists on the site and this is not acceptable to us. We have similar concerns in Corktown.

We ask that the Preservation Board approve the recommendations and report from the Chief Planner dated March 9, 2017.
