RE: <u>TE32.11 Changing Lanes: The City of Toronto's Review of Laneway Suites - City-Initiated Official Plan Amendment and Zoning Amendment - Final Report</u>

Dear Chair Krystin Wong-Tam and Members, Toronto and East York Community Council,

As you are aware, our member residents associations are located either in Toronto and East York (TEY), or North York (NY) District.

First, we are puzzled about why the Review of Laneway Suites has been limited in scope to the TEY District. Even though the vast majority of laneways are located in TEY, we believe that housing policies should be developed and applied on a city–wide basis, since it is likely that the policy will ultimately be expanded to remaining districts, but without the same attention to issues in those areas.

Second, we support concerns raised by ABCRA and Harbord Village RA<sup>1</sup>, TEY resident associations which have participated actively in the Review. They express significant concerns about matters such as:

- 1. Affordability of housing created
- 2. Additional lot density
- 3. Loss of green space and water infiltration capacity
- 4. Lane capacity
- 5. Appeals
- 6. Need to Strengthen Monitoring

We recommend that these matters be addressed before proceeding with the OPA and ZBA.
