Dear Mayor Tory and City Councillors,

As Canada's largest child- and youth-serving organization, Boys and Girls Clubs provide vital programs and services to over 200,000 young people in 700 communities across Canada. Toronto's 101 local Boys and Girls Clubs' service locations are on the front-lines, tackling youth violence and supporting mental health, academic performance and employment for youth throughout our City. The majority of our Clubs serve low-income, racialized and vulnerable children and youth, with all of our Clubs deeply embedded in their community – supporting community cohesion and growth. Our record of success and the strength of our community relationships is how we've earned the confidence and trust of City officials, families, community members, and law enforcement alike.

The Boys and Girls Clubs of Toronto support and engage in the implementation of the City's Youth Equity Strategy and are encouraged by the current discussion of how to better support our City's youth in the after-school period - a critical time where regular participation in programs that promote physical, educational, and emotional development mitigates the risk of unhealthy behaviours including serious crime and violence. We understand that the Economic and Community Development Committee is undertaking a review of the City's youth services and programming. We recognize and support the need for increased access to youth spaces across our City.

However, we urge the city to engage in a thoughtful and measured discussion with the City's existing youth-serving organizations as to how we improve this access. We believe this expansion needs to be coordinated to maximise benefits and that expanding and leveraging existing partnerships will create higher quality and more timely access and outcomes for our City's youth.
