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Health Protection and Promotion Act

4. Every board of health,

(a) Shall superintend, provide or ensure the provision of the health programs and services required by this Act

Mandatory health programs and services:

5.3 Health promotion, health protection and disease and injury prevention, including the prevention and control of cardiovascular disease, cancer, AIDS and other diseases

Ontario Public Health Standards

Infectious and Communicable Diseases Prevention and Control

Program Outcome:

- Priority populations have **increased access to sexual health and harm reduction services** and supports that prevent exposure to and the transmission of sexually transmitted infections and blood-borne infections

Requirements:

7. The board of health shall use **health promotion** approaches to **increase adoption of healthy behaviors** among population regarding sexual practices and injection drug use to prevent and reduce exposures to STBBIs by collaborating and engaging health care providers, community and relevant partners, and priority populations

Ontario Public Health Standards

Substance Use and Injury Prevention

Program Outcome:

There is increased **adoption of healthy living behaviors and personal skills** among populations targeted through program interventions for preventing injuries, preventing substance use, and reducing harms associated with substance use

Requirements:

2. The board of health shall develop and implement a program of public health interventions using a comprehensive health promotion approach that **addresses risk and protective factors** to reduce the burden of preventable injuries and substance use in the health unit population

TUHF program and mandate

TUHF mandate is to provide funding for non-profit organizations within Toronto to build individual and community capacity that will support local initiatives in:

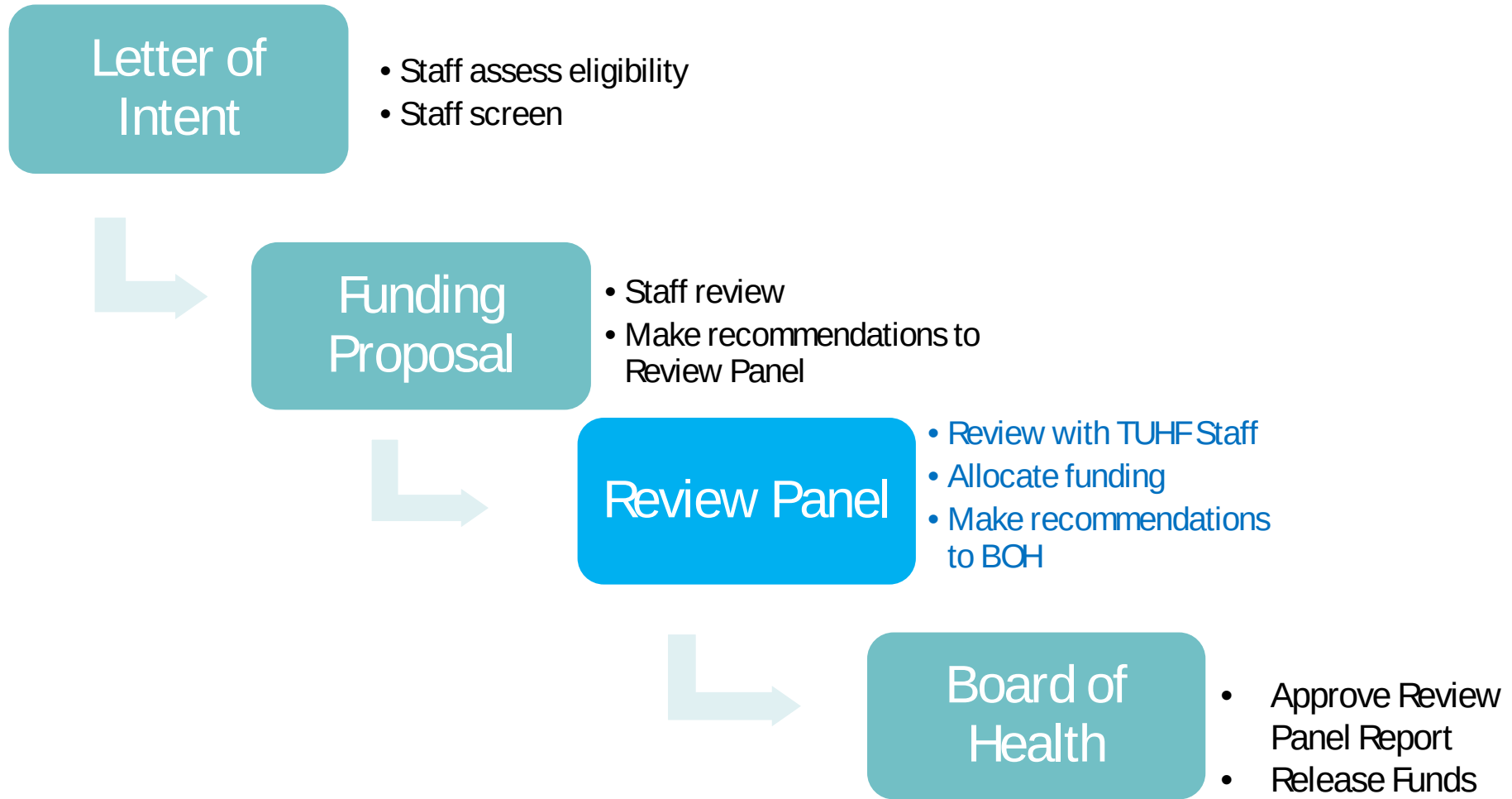

A. Evidence informed/based

- Project uses evidence-based approaches to assess need, select interventions and demonstrate results
- Project demonstrates results through evaluation

B. Reach

- Project is targeting at-risk or high-risk populations
- Project has a sound plan to deliver services to reach at-risk/ high-risk populations

C. Address risks

- Project has clearly identified target population issues/problems
- Issues/problems identified are population specific and relevant to HIV/substance use

D. Improve health outcomes

- Project has identified a relevant set of intervention components
- Intervention is multi-dimensional and directly addresses identified issues/problems

E. Cost effective

- Projected budget is reasonable
- Projected budget is aligned with the complexity of the intervention
