Dear Mayor Tory, Councillor Pasternak, Councillor Perruzza, Councillor Ford and Toronto's City Councillors,

The Mobility Greenway project seeks the extensive use of raingardens, trees and plants to protect a high quality, multi-modal mobility network, which would enable economic opportunities, while developing safe and resilient neighborhoods. There should be safe and appropriate infrastructure so that people are able to use suitable mobility devices to satisfy their needs, e.g. high capacity cargo cycles to haul goods and people, mobility wheelchairs, electric cycles.

Over the past five years, Our Greenway's team has been engaging with workers, businesses, entrepreneurs, and residents across the northwest. We hear the repeated message - arterial roads are dangerous due to oil tankers and other heavy vehicles competing with lighter vehicles, cargo bikes, electric cycles, mobility wheelchairs and people walking who are simply seeking passage on the roads and shallow sidewalks. It is not safe. People walking and people biking have been hurt; several have lost their lives. When it comes to using existing multi use trails and hydro corridors, a complete lack of lights or safety boxes plus a lack of winter path maintenance means that the few off-road pathways suitable for women, seniors and children vanish at night or in cold weather. In addition, local entrepreneurs who don't have competitive financing cannot conduct their businesses effectively or at all. For example, requiring gardeners, handypersons and plumbers to move their equipment by truck raises costs and throttles entrepreneurial opportunities.

Our Greenway and the undersigned supporters propose wide mobility lanes and sidewalks on each side of the road buffered by raingardens, trees and plants. We believe that well managed adjacent parkettes will provide additional entrepreneurial opportunities year-round. The living green infrastructure system will manage storms, filter polluted air and protect people from heavy traffic. Our Greenway's plan will deliver economic impact and support the growth of resilient, safe and prosperous neighbourhoods across the entire network. In sum, implementing the Mobility Greenway will save the City of Toronto and homeowners millions by reducing flooding and enabling quick and practical community mobility – directly addressing the time poverty that is a major factor in ongoing and systemic social and health inequities across northwest Toronto.
