



The City of Toronto's Community Funding Unit (CFU) in the Social Development, Finance and Administration division invests approximately \$24 million dollars a year in not-for-profit organizations, grassroots and resident-led groups building stronger and safer communities. Funded groups support equity-seeking, Black and Indigenous communities in under-resourced neighbourhoods to have improved access to quality services.

Every dollar of CSP funding invested in groups allows them to secure an additional \$64 from other sources



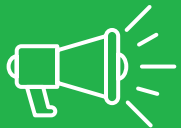
450 funded programs provide support to more than 750K seniors, newcomers, women, children and youth

Resident Leadership



377 grassroots youth leaders received mentorship and funding to create change within their community via the Identify 'N Impact grant program.

68 resident-led groups led projects in Neighbourhood Improvement Areas, where at least 94% of training participants gained essential skills to support their community leadership.
