LASO 2021 City of Toronto Budget Deputation: The Value of Community Arts in the City of Toronto and For the People Who Call it Home

Good afternoon, honourable members of the Budget Committee. I am Laurie-Shawn Borzovoy, Communications Strategist, Creative Director, Writer and Chair of the Board of UrbanArts. And, I am here today speaking on behalf of the six Local Arts Service Organizations (LASOs) of Toronto - Arts Etobicoke, East End Arts, Lakeshore Arts, North York Arts, Scarborough Arts and UrbanArts.

- The LASOs have a shared mission to provide free, accessible and quality programming to the communities we serve.
- We continue to provide programming in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic that responds to the increased needs of our constituencies.
- The Neighbourhood Improvement Areas in our communities have the highest COVID-19 infection rates in the city.
- For the LASOs, this has meant building and delivering new immediate needs-based projects (from food and art supply delivery to online programs addressing isolation and mental health) and adapting our current roster of community arts programs.
- As we focus on community arts sectoral recovery, we are experiencing an increased need and demand for programming that prioritizes:
 - Community building
 - Equity and social justice
 - Mental health and wellness
 - Youth and seniors
 - Neighbourhood pride
 - o And, artist and facilitator employment
- We deliver our programs within high needs, hard hit communities every day.

What we will do:

- As we move into 2021, we reflect on a year of immense change and learning.
- There has been a steep increase in mental health crises, social isolation, the escalation of racism and gender-based violence, all of which has been a direct result of the global pandemic. And, there is an imperative to develop a just recovery plan that means Investments and Opportunities for a more equitable and holistic COVID-19 recovery.

For 2021, the six LASOs will support the rebuilding and recovery efforts by:

- Cultivating increased strategic partnerships
- Expanding community and peer-led initiatives in Neighbourhood Improvement Areas
- Continuing to address issues of access and barriers to participation for equity-seeking groups
- Acting as connectors and catalyzers in our neighbourhoods
- Increasing support and opportunities for artists and culture workers, and
- Addressing precarious employment in the sector













Why Us? Why Now?:

- The LASOs hold a unique position in the arts and cultural sector in Toronto;
- We serve key regions outside the downtown core with the prime function of delivering arts, cultural, advocacy and economic development opportunities to equity-seeking groups in regions where arts and cultural funding is **not** concentrated.
- Because of this, we have a major impact on the livability factor in our communities.
- The 5 downtown Wards receive double the TAC funding than the other 20 Wards do combined.
 - o For Reference: 5 Downtown Ward breakdown:
 - 4 Parkdale-High Park
 - 7 Humber River-Black Creek
 - 10 Spadina-Fort York
 - 11 University-Rosedale
 - 13 Toronto Centre
- As per the **2016 Census Data**, the LASOs serve **83%** of the population of Toronto or a total of **2.7M people**, while funding remains concentrated on the **17%** in the downtown core
- And, as per the TAC 2020 Stats, that per capita amount of funded artists and projects across
 the City is far from equitable. In mid-2020, per capita population investment in Toronto's
 downtown Wards was \$15.61, while investment outside the downtown core was \$2.49.
- In terms of pay equity for artists, downtown artists are paid, on a per capita basis, \$299.48, according to TAC, while artists in the suburbs earn \$105.97 per capita a variance of \$193.51 on average per capita.
- This reflects an incommensurate and inequitable allocation, as **83**% of Toronto's population lives outside the core

The Ask:

- An increased **investment** of **15%**, or **\$273K**, will result in an immediate increased investment in the health of communities outside the downtown core.
- In 2020, the LASO's received **\$1.8M** from the City of Toronto and collectively generated gross revenue totalling **\$3.7M**.
- The LASOs continue to **double** all investments by the City.
- These funds are directly invested into free and accessible programming outside the core, and support and deliver on the City's goals of:
 - Economic Development and Culture Divisional Strategy;
 - Toronto Office of Recovery and Rebuild;
 - 10-Year Public Art Strategy, among others.
- The LASOs funding from the City of Toronto represents merely 3.9% of the total Arts Services budget. This increase would represent a 0.5% increase (bringing us to 4.4% of the total Arts Services budget).
- The LASOs deliver a significant volume of City-supported arts offerings outside of the core, reaching over **301,000** Torontians.
- Presently, the LASO's serve 21 of Toronto's 25 Wards and work within 27 of the City's 31 Neighbourhood Improvement Areas, all which have been disproportionately affected by COVID-19.

In Summation:













- Over the past 3 years, the LASOs have seen new requests from various City departments, greater demands on our time and resources, and reliance on the LASOs in acting as a critical anchor in fulfilling City objectives. With this increased demand there is an increased need for additional investment from the city.
- An increased investment from the City will result in:
 - Greater funding equity in the community arts sector and more equitable dispersion of funds across <u>all City Wards</u>
 - o Increased investment in Human Resources at the LASOs
 - Greater pay-equity for artists and culture workers, given the pandemic's impact of fiscal austerity
 - More meaningful community and peer-led programs that benefit the overall health and well-being of Toronto's communities

We look forward to working together with you all on an equitable and just recovery.
